Harry met a lot of Ottawa boys there, sent his best regards over via those who were homeward-bound, and then crossed the channel back into shell-shocked France to participate in the allied drive, which is now in progress. He writes that he is in the best of health, that everything along the western front is looking up, and that he was looking for a "big show" shortly. Harry, however, discovered that he weighed 200 pounds or thereabout. He feels certain that he will never be able to get down to weight for a forward again, but has decided to become a defence man. He figures that the Ottawas will need a new man for point or cover next season, and is counting on filling the position. Harry followed Ottawa's fight for the N.H.A. championship closely this winter, and will probably be a greatly-disappointed boy when he learns of the tragic outcome of that plucky uphill fight. Broadbent has been overseas since the fall of 1915. 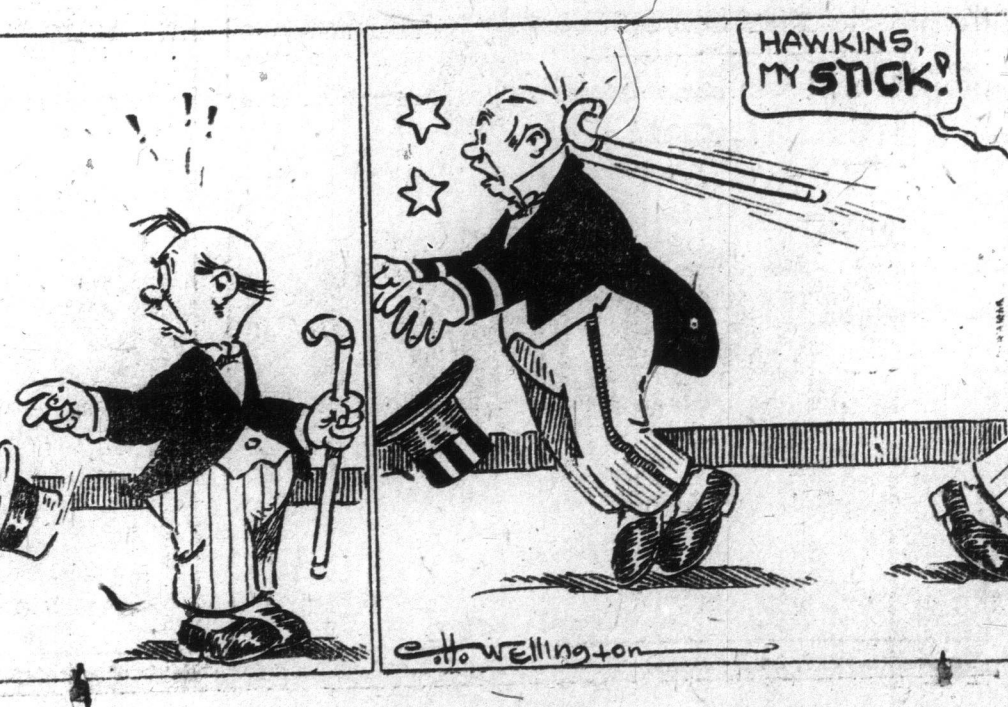
