New York, May 2.—Sixty thousand man Catholic laymen marching in procession this forenoon brought to a climax and formally ended the week long cale bration of the centenary of the four ing of the Roman Catholic diocese of Jew York. The parade had been looked forward as the growning public event of the week, and in every way anticipation was aurpassed. No more perfect day could have favored the event. The sky was almost cloudless, the air clear and bracing. It had been built to accommodate 3,500 persons, and its whole capacity was placed at the distinguished prelates who have been participating in the observance of the ceremony. Of all the sixty thousand who took part in the parade every man, save Brigadier-General Thomas Barry, the grand marshal, was on foot. Behind him trudged the thousands, millionaire and labourer.

Many of the large stores and business places conducted by Catholics had declared a half holiday for today, that their employes might have an opportunity to take part in the parade or to join with the other thousands that orowded the streets to review the marchers.
