YACHT RACE

ON JULY 1ST.

R. K. Y. C. Cruising Race is Attracting a Great Deal of Attention.

About a dozen entries have been received for the cruising race to be held by the R. K. Y. C. on Wednesday July 1st, and several more yachts are expected to enter before the entries close at 6 o'clock this evening. The race for the Leavitt cup on Saturday which was one of the closest and most exciting in years has enthused the boys and plenty of excitement is looked for in the Dominion Day race. The start will be made at 10.30 a.m. and the race will be open to cruising classes in cruising trim.

Following are the arrangements: Course—Starting off the wharf at Millville, through eastern channel, down the Kennebecasis and up the St. John to Carter's Point, leaving the buoy off Carter's Point on port hand, returning to Millville over the same course via the eastern channel, finishing off the club wharf. Flying start, time allowance given at the start. No time limit. No limit to crew. Each yacht must tow a dinghy. Officers of the day: Judges, Robert Thomson and Horace King; time, G. B. Hogan and J. R. Armstrong. Prizes—Articles of equipment, presented by Commodore Thomson, Vice Commodore Merrill, J. A. Likely and J. R. McFarlane. In the evening it is proposed to hold a "banquet" in the club house when the prizes will be awarded.
The annual cruise will commence July 11, when the fleet will sail for Grand Bay and probably to Chipman. A race will be held while the boats at Grand Lake. A large number of the yachts are expected to participate in the cruise this year.

GLOBE TROTTERS

REACH THE CITY

Arthur Bertrand and Joseph Briere Claim to be on Round the World Tour for La Presse.

Two French Canadians arrived in this city this morning giving their names as Arthur Bertrand and Joseph Briere and claiming to be on a round-the-world walk inaugurated by La Presse of Montreal. According to this story they left Montreal at noon on the 1st inst. and arrived in Moncton on the 27th inst. at 9 a.m. and departing from the railway town at 2 p.m. yesterday they allege to have walked the intervening eighty-eight miles reaching here at 7.30 this morning.

One of the pedestrians is exhausted and his companion is desirous of securing a local young man in his stead. Bertrand the leader will travel by steamship tomorrow to Boston and will walk from thence to New York where he will embark on an ocean liner for Liverpool. He hopes to complete the tour of the world in fourteen months and while here will make his headquarters at Stillwell's restaurant 612 Main street.

Supervised Playground on Every Day Club Grounds Opened This Afternoon.

The supervised playground on the Every Day Club grounds was opened this afternoon by the playgrounds committee of the Women's Council. The teachers will be Miss Robertson and Miss Beattie. Preparations were under way all morning to have everything in readiness for the children this afternoon.

The use of the Centennial School grounds and a room in the building has been granted to the playgrounds committee for five weeks—from July 8 to August 8.
