FAST TRIALED PACERWilliam Reid Secures One With
Mark of 2.27 From A. H.
Merrill

A telephone message from St. John last evening from Fred. Duncan, who can claim a successful racing stable, stated that the report in circulation here yesterday that he had imported a new trialed pacer from the United States was true.

It was learned, however, that a pacer with a mark of 2.27 and a fraction had been purchased by Mr. Merrill, of St. John, from A. H. Merrill, of Danvers, Mass., through Duncan, but had not reached St. John.

The new pacer will likely race in St. John today and will probably be raced in Mr. Duncan's racing stable on a half-mile run in faster than 2.10, and will be a notable addition to the racing material in the province.

Before the bell rings for the first race in the province this year, some other fast paced ones from Mr. Merrill's racing stable will likely be the property of provincial owners.

Incidentally, Mr. Duncan said over the phone that he would probably be in Fredericton within a week and his arrangements now are to move his racing stable to the Fredericton Park Association's track just as early as possible, probably about the first week in May.

AMATEUR BOXING

The following are the classes: Bantam, 105 pounds; feather, 115 pounds; special, 125 pounds; light, 135 pounds; welter, 145 pounds; middle, 158 pounds; heavy, all over 158 pounds. The championships are open only to registered amateurs, rules of C. A. A. U. to govern. The prizes are: A gold medal emblematic of the championship of Canada to the winner in each class; a silver medal to second and a bronze medal to third.

An entry fee of \$2 is charged for each event. The fee will be returned to all competitors entering the ring at proper weight.

Entries will close with N. H. Crow, secretary C. A. A. U., 413 Yonge street, Toronto, on April 8. Contestants must weigh in each evening at 5.30 or after, when they must undergo a medical examination.

Chicago, Ill., March 16.—Johnson's plans shifted with some rapidity today. At noon he was undecided as to a trip to his old home. At one o'clock he suddenly concluded to make the trip and so telegraphed his mother. At 2.30 he received a telegram from New York, the contents of which did not bode but which seemed to please him. His plans promptly changed again.

"I've got a chance to meet Jeffries in New York and I am on my way," he said to an Associated Press reporter who went to him in the telegraph office. "I've just sent a second telegram to my mother, telling her I can't visit her for two weeks or more. I want to see Jeffries face to face. If he is in the boxing game, he will talk to me. We can accomplish more face to face on a business proposition than can be done with a hundred letters and telegrams. I've received word that now is the time to catch him and I'm not going to overlook the chance. In addition I have some arrangements to make with regard to my theatrical engagements, which I am informed, cannot wait. I will leave here for the Pennsylvania tomorrow at 2.45 and will be in New York the next morning. Then I'll look up Jeffries. I am sure to visit Galveston, but I may have to wait two or three weeks."
