#### ANNAPOLIS NEWS.

**Sent to Jail on Charge of Man-slaughter and Perjury—General News.**

Annapolis, March 20.—The two men, Daniel Robinson and Elmer Wilson, who accompanied the late George McGarvey part of the way to his home at Parker's Cove and left him in an intoxicated condition to perish, were on Saturday arrested on a charge of manslaughter and perjury in connection with the case. Not being able to furnish bail for their standing the incrimination of the case, they were lodged in jail.

John Rose of the Middleton Home, Middletons, who was convicted of several violations of the Scott Act and not paying the fines, was on Thursday last arrested and lodged in the county jail here.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Jefferson took place on Sunday afternoon from the residence of her husband, J. L. Jefferson, Moncton, and notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather, was largely attended. The interment was in the burying ground.

Another shipment of apples consisting of 800 barrels, shipped by Arthur Walcott of Boston and Bogardus Hyde, of Foster, at the Brighton A. C., of Providence, R. I., was Walcott's ability to take a sound thrashing. In every round Hyde smothered him with jabs and uppercuts. Under the onslaught, Walcott never wavered, and invariably came back for more. Walcott was covered with blood at the finish.

Rice was the cleverest featherweight of New London, Conn., made his reappearance in the ring in a fight with Tom Lewis of San Francisco, at Lansing, Mich. The exhibition was very interesting, but Rice was too cleverly outwitted, gaining the verdict on points.

In the preliminary bout of six rounds, Young Johnnie, of Saginaw, Mich., was defeated by Art Black of Detroit, the mill going the limit.

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Honey Melody of Boston had no trouble in taking the measure of Jerry McCarthy, of Butte, Mont., at Butte, Mont. The pair were slated to have it out for 20 rounds. But in the fifteenth, Melody swung the fight, and with a blow on the jaw, gave his man the quietus.

**A Twenty Round Draw.**  
Hot Springs, Ark., Mar. 21.—The Seyres-Ryan bout at White Park last night went 20 rounds to a decision and was witnessed by a large crowd. Ryan, who forced the fighting from the goos, was declared the winner.

#### CHECKERS.

##### British Players Lead.

Boston, March 20.—The fifth day's play in the international checker tournament, concluded two hundred out of the four hundred games, making the total score for the first half 40 to 19 games in favor of the British players; 141 games were drawn.

Today, after the Sunday's rest, proved more favorable to the Americans than any of the previous days. Davis, Reynolds and Dearborn, who were near the foot of the American standing, winning games from Halliwell, Hynd and Gaudet. The British winners were Buchanan from Grover, Seairight from Schneider, and Hynd from Reynolds, two out of three games, making the score for the day—British 4; American 3; drawn 33.

The games were without special feature today, with the exception of the games between Morrill, (Br.) and Barker, all four of which resulted in draws, when it looked to the spectators as though the American had lost each time.

#### BASEBALL.

##### Will Stay With Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Cal., Mar. 21.—Harold Chase, first baseman of the Los Angeles baseball team, who was drafted by Clark Griffith, manager of the New York American league club, has decided to remain on the Pacific coast, and has signed a contract to play with the Los Angeles team during the coming season.

#### TURF GOSSIP.

### PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

#### Winding Ledges Dam and Other Things Discussed in the House of Assembly.

Fredericton, N. B., March 20.—The house met at 3 o'clock. Hon. Mr. Tweedie in reply to Mr. Hazen said debates were issued during the last year as follows:

Subsidiary, New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company, \$44,500.

Aid to grain elevator and wharves, St. John N. B., \$2,500. Total, \$38,000.

No bonds have been issued since the close of the fiscal year.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley in reply to Mr. Hazen said the work of Messrs. A. White, P. B. Carroll and R. A. Lawlor, commissioners for consolidating the statutes, was done under an agreement with the government by which Mr. White, as chairman, was to receive \$10,000 for his services and Mr. Carroll and Mr. Lawlor each \$1,000 in addition to travelling expenses, and they were paid upon this basis, consequently their bills were not submitted to the auditor general for consideration before being paid.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie in reply to Mr. Hazen said: The members of the factory commission are as follows: John Palmer, chairman; Eugene Shivers, Emma S. Fiske, Michael Kelly, Chas. McDonald, James G. Stevens, J. R. secretary. Up to the present time there has been paid \$650 on account of the expenses. The account has not yet been presented. The sum of \$500 was paid on account of travelling expenses and \$150 to the secretary.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said the amount of \$30,000 advanced to the New Brunswick Loan and Investment Co., in a loan granted under circumstances which he explained. The opinion of the audit committee was that it would be disastrous to the public interest if the undertaking was to be allowed to collapse, and accordingly arrangements were made with the bank to make the necessary advances upon the understanding that the requisite legislation should be asked for during the present session. The loan is to bear interest at 5 per cent and to be repaid by the company by rolling stock and earnings.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie in reply to Mr. Hazen said the salary of \$2,000 per annum for the auditor general was approved by the legislature in 1903, and the appointment is for one year.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie in reply to Mr. Hazen gave the following particulars of the same: The province to the charter of the bank on the 8th of March.

Bank of New Brunswick, St. John, provincial hospital account, overdrawn \$45,000.

Bank of British North America, agriculture department, amount of accounts for seed and horses, \$3,579.

Bank of British North America on special loans and overdraft accounts, \$4,945.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said this did not include the amount of work account which would be given tomorrow.

A number of bills were introduced by Mr. Tweedie.

Private bills will be introduced on Monday next.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie directed the attention of the house to the fact that the Winding Ledges dam bill, against which the record of works account in 1903, was again before parliament.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said that the government had already had the subject under consideration, and that Hon. Mr. White will go to Ottawa to oppose the bill. He was not mainly opposed to it, because of affected people on the St. John river, but would take the broader ground that it was an interference with the treaty rights. We have another good ground on which to oppose it from the fact that we have given another full charter to operate at Grand Falls, while this bill gives the American company, the power to build a dam right down to Grand Falls. It is practically impossible that such dams can be erected without interference with the rights of others.

At this juncture Hon. Mr. Pugsley referred to the broken faith of Hon. Mr. Costigan. The B. N. A. Act enacts that provincial legislatures shall have the exclusive right to incorporate companies with province objects. The legislation now sought by Ottawa comes within the rule, and I think it very unfortunate that parliament should seek to enact such legislation which is liable to bring about a clash of authority.

The order of the day being called, Mr. Macmillan made a forcible speech endorsing Premier Tweedie's representation resolution after which it was unanimously carried.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Tweedie, seconded by Mr. Hazen, the lieutenant-governor was requested to forward the resolution to the secretary of state for Canada, with the request that he lay before his excellency the governor general.

The house adjourned at 5:30. The bill in amendment of the act to authorize the St. John common council to make a grant of money for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the assessment commission was considered.

Mr. Macmillan explained that the object of the bill was to authorize the common council to make further expenditures to enable the commission to obtain information in regard to the rental of real estate.

The bill was held over until Wednesday to enable Mr. Macmillan to communicate with the common council.

##### Mrs. Isabel Emelton.

Mrs. Isabel Emelton, of Manners Sutton, widow of James Emelton, died at her residence on Saturday morning, March 19, 1905, after a long and painful illness.

She was the eldest daughter of the late David Little, and was sixty years of age. She is survived by an aged mother, three brothers, and two sisters. She also leaves five daughters, and a number of grandchildren.

##### Leonore Rourke.

Leonore Rourke, age five years, eldest child of John J. Rourke, of the St. John News Works, died last evening at 329 Charlotte St., W. H. - She had been ill with diphtheria.

##### M. H. Tole.

M. Henry Tole, third son of Patrick Tole, clerk at the Provincial Hospital, died yesterday, after an illness of five weeks. He was 29 years of age.

##### Edmond Archibald.

Edmond Archibald, of Lower Treto, and a nephew of the late Sir Adam G. Archibald, died at his home on Saturday, March 19, 1905, at the age of 65 years.

##### Joseph Maher.

Joseph Maher, brother of the late Michael W. Maher, and a former resident of this city, died in San Francisco on March 18, aged 65 years. He leaves one brother, Peter of Dorchester (Mass.), and two sisters, Miss Agnes of New York, and Mrs. Katherine Gallagher of Winnipeg.

##### Alexander Johnston.

Alexander Johnston, a carpenter of 55 Richmond St., died early yesterday morning. He was born in Berwick, New Brunswick, and is survived by four sons—George, William, Robert, and Alexander, and three daughters—Mrs. William Cunningham, Mrs. Patrick McCann, and Mrs. Jas. Brickle.

##### Joseph G. Seely.

Joseph Gilbert Seely, died recently at Yukon City, Alaska. He was a native of Weymouth N. S., and left there in 1849 during the gold rush to California.

##### Elizabeth J. Matthews.

Elizabeth J. Matthews, widow of Adam G. Matthews, died yesterday at the residence of her son, Rev. W. C. Matthews, aged seventy-four years. Deceased had been sick only a few weeks with heart trouble and although she was not expected to live
