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ST. JOHN'S TAX RATE THIS YEAR WILL BE \$1.90.

The tax rate this year in St. John will be \$1.90 per \$100. There is to be a raise of \$0.47, which will be some \$30,000 greater than was required from the tax payers in 1905, and the chamberlain's list shows 115 fewer ratepayers than last year.
