Mrs. C. W. Sweet of this city has received word from the nursing sister in England to the effect that her son, Corporal C. W. Sweet, has been admitted to Duchess of Connaught's Red Cross Hospital, England, from the base hospital in France, suffering from nephritis.

Bantams Ready.

It is reported that the 216th "Bantam" Battalion is to proceed overseas in the near future. It is just possible that they will be quartered in St. John for a time. The unit will proceed overseas at full strength.

Col. Eaton Dead.

Lieutenant-Colonel D. I. Vernon Eaton, of the Royal Canadian Artillery, at one time connected with the Royal Canadian Regiment in Fredericton, has died of wounds in France. Colonel Eaton was a son of James K. Eaton of Truro, N. S., and was forty-eight years old.

Hugh Cunningham.

Sussex, N. B., April 13—Hugh Cunningham, a well known and highly respected citizen of the town, died early this morning of blood poisoning, caused by a scratch by a rusty nail in the finger. A few days later he contracted pneumonia, which hastened the end. The deceased was fifty-seven years of age and was survived by a wife and two sons—Roy, of the C. N. R., Vermillion (Alta.), and Lloyd, at home.

The funeral will take place Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Service will be at the home; interment in the town cemetery. Rev. Mr. Mitchell will officiate.

Reuben Johnson died on Friday at St. Louis, Kent County, at the age of ninety-four years. He was a former member of the provincial legislature.

GREAT BRITAIN AND SPAIN IN COMMERCIAL CONVENTION

A new commercial convention between Spain and Great Britain has been concluded. Among its stipulations is an agreement that Great Britain shall supply 150,000 tons of coal monthly to Spain. In return Spain will export to England as much ore as it requires. The Spanish government agrees to permit the chartering of Spanish ships by the British government.

In Interests of Military Y.M.C.A.

Prominent Citizens Hear Reports of Work at the Front—Gathering the Guests of Senator Thorne

A large number of prominent citizens gathered last evening in the Union Club on the invitation of Senator Thorne to meet Major Birks, Captain Cameron and Captain Bishop of the Y. M. C. A., who are back from the front on a campaign to raise \$750,000 for the military work of the association. The company met in the dining hall of the club where Senator Thorne addressed them briefly with reference to the object of the visit. He also commended the Y. M. C. A. military activities and pointed out the good they were doing at the front.

Major Birks was then introduced to the gathering and was given a grand ovation. He told of the work accomplished in France and also how the number of Y. M. C. A. camps had been increased in England. At the present time he said they had fifty centres in England and thirty-seven in France. Rev. Captain W. J. Cameron then spoke on "The Challenge of the Men in Service at the Front to the Men in Service at Home." He gave a short sketch of the value of the work and of the obligation of the people to contribute the funds necessary to carry on the work of the Y. M. C. A.

Mayor Hayes extended a cordial welcome to the visitors and expressed confidence in the answer they would receive to their appeal throughout Canada.

H. A. Powell, who was in Washington and heard President Wilson deliver his famous message to Congress, told how the people were thrilled by the president's message and how the nation responded. He also spoke of the good being done by the Y. M. C. A.

Following the addresses, refreshments were served. A most enjoyable evening was spent by all.
