YEARS ON I. C. R.Death of Andrew Raimie Who  
Retired as Conductor in  
1907

One of the oldest members of Union Lodge of Portland, F. &amp; A. M., and a member of St. Andrew's Society, Andrew Raimie, died yesterday in his residence, 150 Wright street, aged 69 years. Deceased was a native of Chatham, where he was born May 9, 1841. He had been in the employ of the I. C. R. for forty-eight years and while a conductor was retired in 1907. During his lengthy service on the railroad he had acquired a wide popularity with all classes of the traveling public.
