

LARGE CROWD SEES FAIR END

More Than 2,000 People at
Event for Orphans Last
Night

Prize Winners are Announced—
Practically Everything for
Sale is Bought

More than 2,000 people attended the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage Fair on the closing night last evening, when practically everything for sale was bought up and no auction was necessary. Drawings for the smaller articles on which tickets had been taken were carried out and the winners announced, but the drawings on the automobile and on the set of books donated by W. E. Earle will not take place until all returns are in, which will probably be a few weeks longer. While it will be some time before the proceeds of the fair can be circulated it is believed that it has realized a highly satisfactory sum to go towards the reduction of the debt in the orphanage maintenance account.

The vegetables which remained and a few articles donated that were not suitable for prizes at the fair, such as clothing for the children, are to be taken to the orphanage and will do their part in helping to reduce future maintenance costs. The popular future maintenance result will be announced today. All returns were not in last night. The judging and counting for the drawings last night were done by J. W. Clayton and Walter Barnes.

N. Y. MILLIONAIRE DIES OF EXPOSURE

Had Been Big Game Hunting
Near Jacquet River—Col-
lapsed on Road.

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 14—John O. Martin, millionaire business man of New York, lost his life at Jacquet River on Tuesday morning as the result of exposure, according to the verdict of the coroner's jury.

Martin with a companion had been big game hunting near Jacquet River the last ten days. Early Tuesday morning Martin started from Camp for Jacquet River, 14 miles away. Later, he was found on the road unconscious and died shortly after. The body was forwarded to New York today.

STEAMER TO LAKES TAKES FULL CARGO

Lakefield Overbooked and An-
other Vessel is Being Negoti-
ated For.


The steamer Lakefield, of the Lakefield Steamship Line, arrived in port Tuesday morning from Port Arthur, Toronto, Montreal and Halifax, discharged and loaded general cargo and sailed that night on a return trip to the above named ports.

At the head of the Lake for the purpose of taking care of the business and it is expected that this sailing will be about Tuesday next.

This is the last trip of the Lakefield to Port Arthur this season, but it is expected that the steamer will make another trip from Saint John to Montreal. This will close the season but the ship will be put on the regular route again next season.

Another steamer, the Torhamvan, with Furness Withy Co. as the local agents, has been running between Saint John, Halifax and Upper Canadian ports for several months, and like the Lakefield, is carrying large general cargoes between the ports.

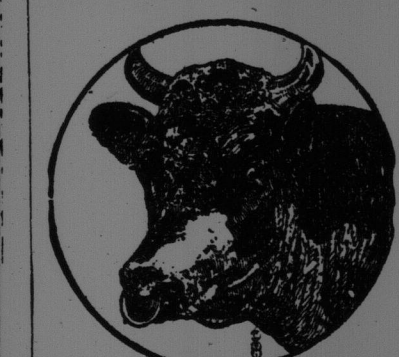
