FOUND SMOKING

Many Youngsters Confirmed Tobacco Users, Says Campbellton Nurse

Red Cross Society Takes Action to See That Selling Law

IN investigating the lamentable practice of cigarette-smoking among local school pupils of tender age, Miss MacPhail, the pubilic health nurse here, has made an important and rather startling discovery in learning that many youngsters in the lower grades are apparently confirmed tobacco-users, says The Campbellton Graphic, which continues: The discovery—at first more or less accidental though later followed up in an endeavor to ascertain the extent of the regrettable practice—discloses the disturbing fact that even many pupils in Grade II. are smoking regularly. One youngster in Grade III. when questioned, replied with something of the air of an old smoker, that he smoked "about a box a day."

TO TRY TO STOP IT. In other grades, too, the habit is even more deeply rooted and the situation, regarded from any angle, is frankly disturbing. When asked where they secured their cigarettes in most cases the pupils replied, "Oh, anywhere." Several, of course, were able to state at what stores they obtained their "smokes," but all names mentioned are withheld for obvious reasons.

Following this discovery, however, the Red Cross Society propose to see that the situation is remedied at once. The law prohibits the sale of tobacco in any form to minors and it is the intention of the society to see that this regulation is adhered to. There is no desire to lay any charge against any particular merchant at present as a great many children frequently buy tobacco for a parent, but the society are now further investigating the matter now further investigating the matter and following this warning will take whatever measures are considered necessary to have the law observed by all.
