In launching the campaign the

drugists made an unusually strong appeal

to the public by emphasizing the point

that the drugist serves the public more

hours every day and night than any other

retailer, and he does it because it is

necessary that the public have nearly

constant access to drugs needed to pre-

serve life.

Individual drugists are cashing in on

the campaign by including in store ad-

vertisements the two slogans which are

being emphasized, "The Drugist is

More Than a Merchant," and "Try the

Drug Store First." These slogans also

are being used in window displays by

the retailers.

These slogans will also be printed on

the stationery and envelopes used by

the drugists with the trade, will be

printed on statements and popularized

in other ways. Window cards will about

them at the passersby. The aim is to

make them familiar to every person in

the community.

the newspapers, insisted on a provision

that none of the general advertising copy

should appear on the same page in the

paper which carried the advertisement

of any local druggist. If this was per-

mitted that druggist would, it was felt,

obtain an undue advantage.

"Electric Clerk" Is

Latest Store Device

The Piggy-Biggy system, the gro-

cer's and all the other, "clerks" were

designed to reduce the expenses of clerk

hire.

Now Dr. Van Antwerp Clark, en-

gineer and inventor, who is credited

with having co-operated in the develop-

ment of the machine-switching ap-

paratus for the automatic telephone,

announces that his latest invention is a

machine designed to deliver merchan-

dise across the counter by electricity.

Dr. Clark declares that his electric

push-button contrivance, which can be

operated by the salesgirls in retail stores,

will mean the reduction of 80 per cent

of the sales force and will virtually

eliminate the practice of shoplifting.

The apparatus consists simply of

push-button, slot machines and chutes

and is used principally for the distri-

bution of packaged goods. The mer-

chandise is stacked on the shelves and

leading from these stacks are chutes

which end at specified places on the

counter. Each spot is marked with a

round disk showing the brand of coffee,

flour, cigarettes or what not, on the

shelves. The type of goods, of course,

varies with the kind of store.

An electric push-button works on a

dial, the purpose of the button being to

establish electrical contact. Turning

the dial to, say, No. 1, for a package of

Taste-Well coffee, the customer presses

the key and the electric pusher throws

the coffee into the chute and sends it

sliding into the waiting customer's

hand. The chute is spirited so as to re-

tard the speed of the tumbling package,

and to keep it from being thrown on

the floor.

If a customer wants four or five

packages of different goods, he repeats

the same process, only he presses each

disk, but a single push of the key

brings them down simultaneously. This

does away instantly with crowding at

the counters and gives almost instan-

aneous service.
