WHEN THE HUNS REALIZED THAT THEY WERE BEATEN

Berlin, April 19.—(By Canadian Press)

It was in July, 1917, that the German military machine first admitted they were beaten and could be saved only by the submarine warfare. This brought clearly out by an article in Die Glocke, on some dairies of Herr H. P. Hansen, former Danish member of the Reichstag. In these are given some new details of events in the Reichstag on the debate on Herr Eraberger's peace resolution of July, 1917. Ruthless submarine warfare had then been in progress for a whole year, and there had been grumbling and dissatisfaction at the non-fulfillment of the promises that six months of it were to bring England to her knees.

Herr Eraberger's speech in the Reichstag on July 6 was regarded as, in many respects, the turning point of the war. The voting of the credits, he said, meant that the war would continue for another year. That would cost 50 milliards (25,000,000,000) and more than 200,000 lives. Could Germany, he asked, bring England down before she herself collapsed? He did not believe it was possible, and Germany must therefore recede. He warned the Kaiser against living in the background out of touch with his people, and cited the aloofness of the Czar from the Russian people as the cause of the Russian revolution. Herr Hansen says this speech of Eraberger's stripped the veil from Hitler's juggling with figures, and it

brought the Poles, Alsace-Lorrainers, and other oppressed nationalities into the open with the truth about the feeling of their constituents towards Germany.

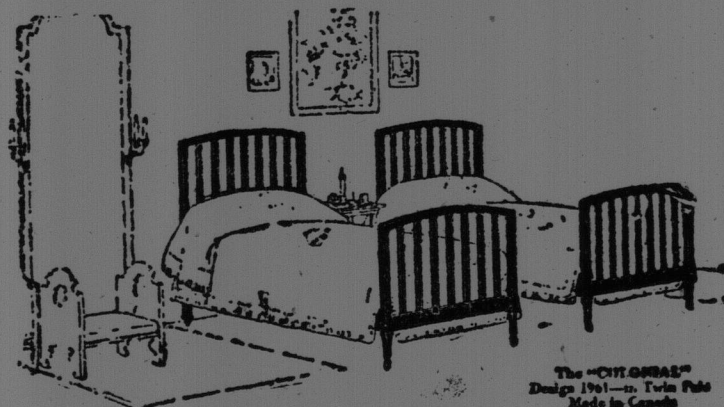
A letter from Hindenburg was read after Herr Eraberger's speech. This must have made it plain to the Reichstag that the German army had shot its bolt and looked to the navy alone for salvation. Hindenburg wrote that "as hope that the conclusion of an early peace has had to be abandoned it is necessary to hold on until we bring victory from the enemy. The enemy is held at a distance from the frontiers of stuffs and raw materials in the country for continuing the war until the U boat war forces a decision. Our food conditions will not get worse during the coming year. But every peace discussion helps prolong the war."

Herr Eraberger responded by quoting Admiral Capelle, who had said that America as a military power was equivalent to nought, and that the war would be over before she could intervene. He also quoted a letter from Lundenorff, who said:—"The navy has undertaken that England is to be destroyed before the end of August." After their experiences, he said, they could not put unlimited faith in government utterances. Finally Herr Hansen depicts Herr Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the Chancellor, declaring that "if the enemy wants peace he must come to us."

Speaking in Ottawa last week a Montreal man urged the value of parks and playgrounds in cities. Parks existed for two purposes, health and recreation. He had to use for the keep-off-the-grass variety.

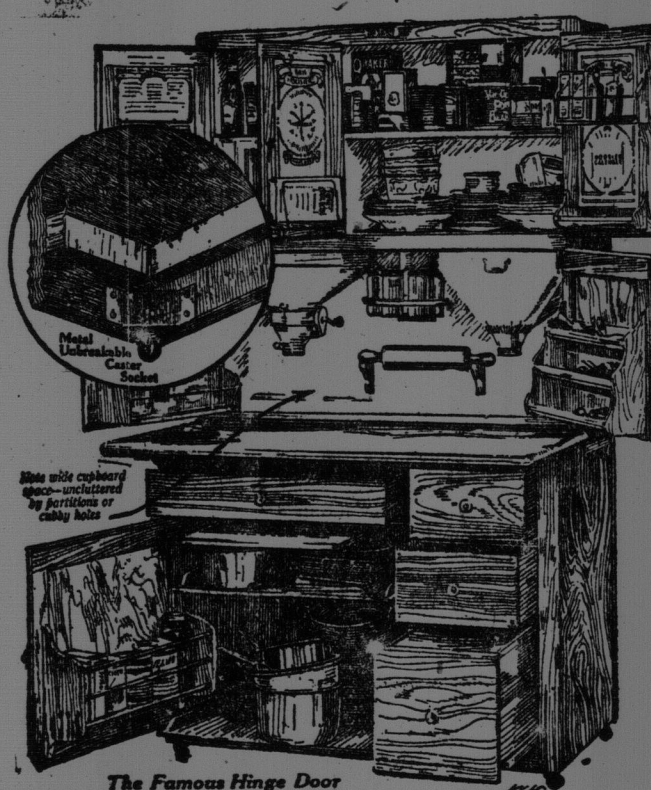

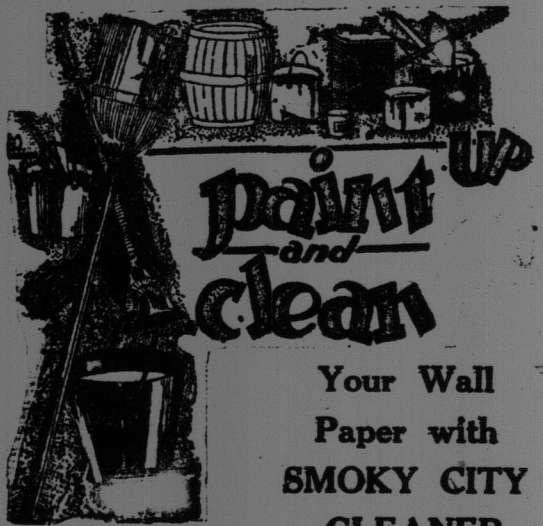
