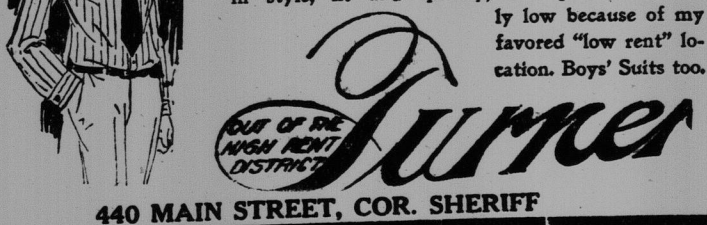

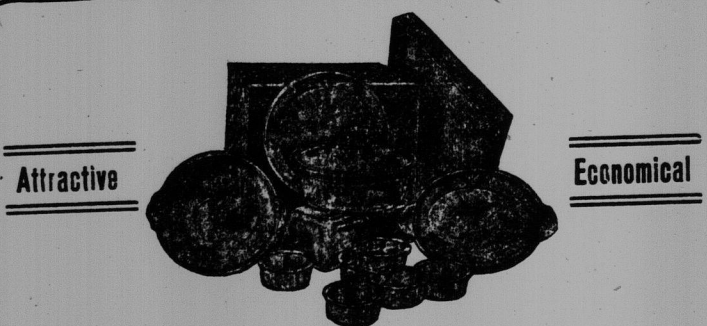

LOCAL NEWS

DIED IN EVERETT.

Word of the death of Frank Sproul, eldest son of Anne Wilson, and the late Robert Sproul of St. John has been received here. He passed away in Everett, Mass. Mr. Sproul was born in St. John twenty-five years ago and was a grandson of Mrs. Eliza London of Harrison street.

CARLETON FIRE.

The fire department were called out last night about 11.55 when an alarm was rung in from box 118 for a fire in the home of Samuel Watters, at the foot of Duke street, West End. The origin of the fire is unknown but is thought to have started in the attic and was not allowed to get through the roof, yet considerable damage was done by water. The family were all in bed except one member when a man passing by informed her that he thought the house was on fire. Then he rang in the alarm.

WOMAN M. P. P. HERE FOR NATIONAL COUNCIL MEETING

Mrs. Ralph Smith of Vancouver Heartily Greeted

Has Done Much for Progressive Legislation in the Far Western Province and Has More Plans in View.

Among the delegates who arrived in the city this morning to attend the National Council of Women, was Mrs. Ralph Smith, M. P. P. of Vancouver, B. C. Mrs. Smith is a dominion vice-president, and comes as a representative of British Columbia. She was warmly greeted by the assemblage.

Mrs. Smith is the only woman member of the legislature of British Columbia and through her efforts several laws have been passed which have made a marked improvement in the social and domestic conditions in that province. Among those passed through her efforts are a minimum wage, which has been a great boon to women and girls; an equal guardianship law which wiped from the statute book the old English law which gave the guardianship of the family to the father; a deserted wives maintenance act; men's pension laws which increase the allowance to women and children; a measure for protection before and after the adoption of children. In addition a mental survey was made throughout the province, a result of which meant a complete reorganization of plans for the benefit of those children, and the erection of a suitable institution where they are being properly cared for. A juvenile court was also established with a woman judge, and a home erected for delinquent boys. A law was also passed giving protection to women whose husbands died without leaving a will, so that they would be enabled to secure a rightful portion of the estates etc.

Mrs. Smith has many more plans for the protection of the home and the betterment of conditions, which she has every hopes of being realized. She does not remember when she did not work for securing the ballot for her sex. She was president of the I. O. D. E., was president of the Canadian Club in Vancouver, and did considerable Red Cross work during the war. During her regime as president of the Canadian Club the first returned soldiers' club was formed and it has developed into a wonderful organization.

In addition Mrs. Smith has frequently occupied non-conformist pulpits and on many occasions pulpits have been thrown open to her. She still hopes to be able to carry on good work and eventually see her dreams of the past become a realization.

Mrs. Smith's husband entered politics in 1898 and was a successful candidate for the provincial house in British Columbia. In 1900 he was elected to the federal house, but was defeated in 1911 on the reciprocity pact. He again offered for the provincial house and was elected and later given the portfolio of minister of finance. He died suddenly four years ago and one year later Mrs. Smith entered the field and after an arduous campaign won out by more than 4,000 of a majority. She has been on the floor of the house for the last three sessions.

Mrs. Smith feels a peculiar and warm interest for St. John as her son was united in marriage to Miss Innis Ogilvie, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Ogilvie, formerly of this city. She says she is very proud of the St. John connection in her family.

F. A. BARBOUR TO READ PAPER ON ST. JOHN WATERWORKS

Montreal, June 16—Next Monday until Friday there will be held in Montreal the fortieth annual convention of the American Water Works Association. It is expected that more than 1,000 water works men from all over the continent will be in attendance. Among papers to be read will be one on the water works of St. John, N. B., by Frank A. Barbour.

CUT OFF CITY'S SUPPLY OF MILK

This is Last Day, Decision of Kings County Producers

Say They'll Send No More Into St. John Until the Sussex Train Is Put Back on Old Time.

Matters have reached a crisis over the question of running the morning Sussex train into St. John on daylight or old time. After today, the Kings county producers have decided they will send no more milk or cream until the train is put back on old time. The notification comes in the following letter to The Times:—

To the Editor of the Times—

Sir—At a well attended meeting of the Kings County Milk and Cream Producers, held in Apohaqui last evening it was unanimously decided that after Wednesday, June 16, no milk or cream would be shipped to St. John until the Sussex express has been put back in proper place and run on Atlantic time. The farmers feel that the change of the trains to so-called daylight time was an unfair and unwarranted action on the part of the railway officials and against the best interests of the majority of the people throughout the district supposed to be supplied by this train. This train in question is an express and not a passenger train, and especially has been considered to be a farmers' train, carrying, as it does, four-fifths of the milk and a large amount of other farm produce used in the city of St. John.

Following the action of the railway officials in changing the time of the train, which was done with only one day's notice to the farmers, a delegation met with W. R. Levensh, eastern superintendent of the C. N. R., and presented sound arguments and asked that the train in question be run on the old time. Our answer received one week later was to the effect that the train would not be changed. The farmers were then asked by Mayor Schofield to send a delegation to his office and there meet a number of suburbanites. This was done, but the only result was to hold the farmers back for more than a week longer. The farmers have no quarrel with either the milk dealers or consumers in St. John. From information which we have we believe that many in St. John are opposed to daylight time, and we regret that our own will without doubt cause these people inconvenience. We believe that this daylight fad was brought forward and pushed through by a few enthusiasts and gradually forced upon many not in favor. It has been shown that daylight time is not favorable to farm operations. The farmers do not purpose being forced to adopt this time, and have therefore been forced to the decision of last evening and are prepared to stay with that until their demands for train service are met.
