LABOR PLANS FOR ONTARIO HOUSE

Legislation That is to be Asked
For—A Whip is Selected.

(Canadian Press.)
Toronto, Feb. 25.—Charles Swayze, M. P. for Niagara Falls, Ont., will be the Labor whip in the Ontario legislature. The election was made yesterday at a caucus of the Labor members here.

It was agreed to ask for the abolition of the property qualification for candidates for municipal offices; for the appointment of a commission to investigate the feasibility of an eight-hour day; for the pensions to include not only the provincial government but also the municipal government to bear the expense of administering the pension; instead of having the municipalities share in the expense.

Amendments to the Workmen's Compensation act wanted by the Labor members include an increase of the general compensation; to be paid to the widows of skilled workmen made equal to that of widows whose husbands were killed prior to April 1 last, get an equal amount to those widowed since then, instead of \$20 and \$20 a month respectively, as under the act at present, that is, all to be paid \$30 a month.

A helpful letter from the provincial president, Mrs. J. S. Perry, was read. Mrs. Stevens of Fredericton wrote regarding her work as L. T. 2, superintendent and it was agreed to have this letter read at the next meeting of the county W. C. T. U.

The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Y. M. C. A. at its monthly meeting yesterday afternoon, in the Y. M. C. A. buildings, unanimously elected Miss Alice Eddy honorary president. The newly elected president, Mrs. Eustace Barnes, occupied the chair for the first time. Only routine business was transacted.

MOTHER'S PENSION.

Father Will Get Mother in Colorado if Compelled to Migrate the Children.

pelled to take active charge of caring for his children is eligible for a pension under the Colorado mother's pension law, according to a ruling by Judge B. B. Lindsay, of the juvenile court. Judge Lindsay granted F. U. Draper of Lincoln, Neb., a pension of \$10 a month for the mother's pension act, as the father of the children and the sole living parent. Under the law it will be possible for Draper to receive a maximum of \$60 a month for the support of his children. If his application is favorably acted upon.

PAY OF TEACHERS IN

STRICKEN ON WAY HOME, YOUNG MAN PASSES AWAY

Clair London of Carleton
County Dies in Somerville,
Mass.—Death of Horatio
London.

Bloomfield community was greatly shocked in learning of the death of Clair London, only son of Mrs. Fannie London of Bloomfield, Carleton county, at the early age of twenty-three. About three weeks ago he went on a short trip to Boston, Mass., and Bridgeport Conn. While on his way home he was taken ill with the influenza and got only as far as Somerville in a true friend in the person of Rev. R. A. Colpitts took care of him. A room was secured in a private hospital and the sick boy was tenderly removed from the parsonage. A few days later pneumonia developed. In spite of the faithful services of doctors and nurses and all that loving friends could do, his condition grew more serious until on the evening of Feb. 19 he died.

His widowed mother had the sorrowful satisfaction of being with him during his last three days. Rev. Mr. Colpitts accompanied her and the body to Bloomfield, where interment was made on Feb. 21. The funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. B. Champion, assisted by Rev. R. A. Colpitts.

Horatio London.
On Feb. 4 the community of Bloomfield, Carleton county, suffered the loss of one of its most highly respected residents in the person of Horatio London in the fifty-ninth year of his age. His father, Rev. R. A. Colpitts, was born where he was born in the year 1861. Mr. London was a man of genial disposition and sterling character, which won for him a host of friends. He was a member of the Methodist church and was in the choir for forty-two years.

A little more than a year ago on account of failing health he sold his farm and moved to Bloomfield Corner. He is survived by his wife, who was Almida Hanning, and three brothers—William, Charles and Edward of Woodstock, and Nelson of Easton, Maine. Rev. J. B. Champion officiating at the services.

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VISITING PULP MEN FROM SWEDEN

Montreal, Feb. 25.—Baron John Mannerheim and Christian Storchmann, representatives of the Swedish Pulp Association, passing through here as the guests of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association, when seen at the Ritz Carlton hotel yesterday, said that they were in this country on a return visit to the American Pulp and Paper Association.

Baron Mannerheim, speaking of the European situation, said that Germany was ripe for Bolshevism and Finland's frontier must be protected at all costs from the forces of Soviet Russia. Once they penetrated Finland, the economic struggle of Germany would fall almost instantaneously and the whole of eastern Europe would be involved.
