A wrecked freight near Memramcook held up traffic on the I. C. R. for two hours last evening.

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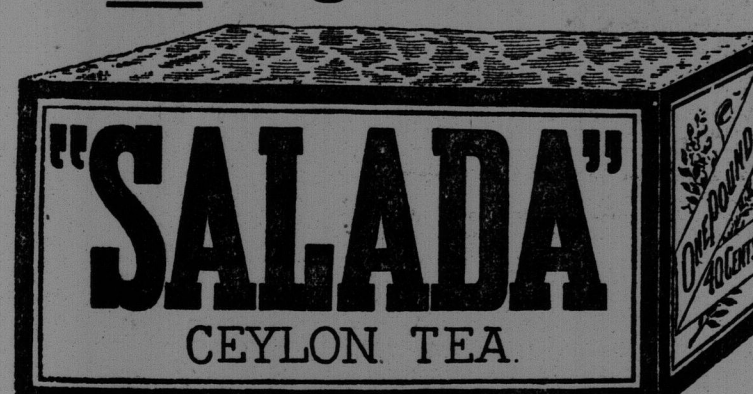

MR. CARVELL AND ATTY.-GEN. CLARKE

The Telegraph yesterday received the following letters from Attorney-General Clarke:
Attorney-General New Brunswick, Fredericton, N. B., Aug. 8, 1914.
To the Editor of The Telegraph.

Sir—In the Saturday issue of your paper, Mr. Carvell is reported as saying: "The government of the province could get the books (meaning the New York books of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company) if they did their duty. The government now owned a majority of the company's stock and the people are entitled to a strict account."

Will you permit me to say that Mr. Carvell could have used these words only under an entire misapprehension of the fact. The government has never owned, and does not now own, any portion of the stock of the St. John & Quebec Railway Company.

Knowing Mr. Carvell's deep sense of honor, I am sure he will accept the first opportunity to retract the statement.

Mr. Carvell's Reply.
F. B. Carvell, K. C. M. P., to whom the substance of Mr. Clarke's letter was communicated by The Telegraph, promptly took up the Attorney-General's challenge. Instead of retracting Mr. Carvell's statement, he reaffirmed it, directing Mr. Clarke's attention, and the public's, to Mr. Carvell's words to the effect that the last session guaranteeing the additional \$2,000,000 of bonds.

The section referred to by Mr. Carvell is as follows:
"4 George V., 1914.—An act providing further aid for the construction of a line of railway along the valley of the Saint John River—C. 10, S. 12

"Before any of the bonds authorized by the Act are guaranteed by the St. John & Quebec Railway Company, fifty-one per cent. (51 p. c.) of the authorized capital stock of the said company shall be assigned

to and vested in His Majesty, for and on behalf of the Province, as fully paid up and non-assessable stock, and the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council may, from time to time, appoint two of the Board of Directors of said Company, none of which Directors so appointed need be a shareholder in such Company."

"The act speaks for itself," said Mr. Carvell. "The government cannot take refuge behind any statement like Mr. Clarke's. It cannot escape by any such back-door method as that. I reaffirm my statement in its entirety. If the government hasn't the stock it is due to its own negligence or something worse. They can settle that between them."

PROMINENT K. C. OF NEWFOUNDLAND HERE
On his return from St. Paul, Miss., where he attended the Supreme Convention of the Knights of Columbus, C. O'Neil Conroy, territorial vice-commander Newfoundland, passed through the city yesterday for his home in St. John's. He said that the convention was attended by about 4,000 K. C.'s and had been a distinct success. A vast increase in membership had been reported.

Mr. Conroy, who is one of the best known knights in the east, and one of the most prominent in Newfoundland, was warmly greeted by members of St. John council at the depot.

ENTERTAINMENT FOR VISITING TEMPLARS
The visiting members of St. Omer Commandery, Knights Templars, from Massachusetts, with their ladies were entertained by the local knights at a reception in the Masonic Temple last evening. During the evening gold and ribbon badges were exchanged between the visiting knights and the local ladies.
