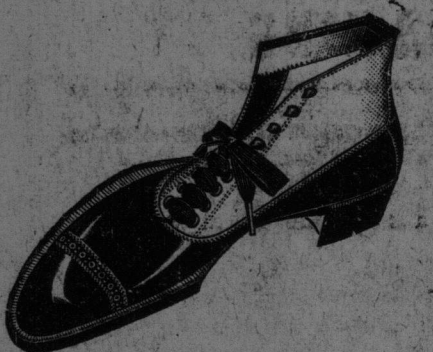

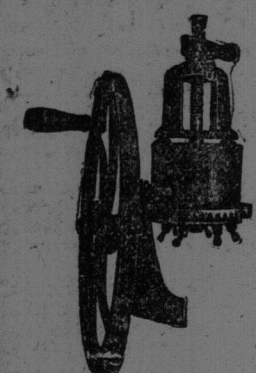

FAVOR EXTENSION OF THE BREAKWATER TO ISLAND

The necessity of extending the breakwater to Partridge Island was impressed upon the ferry committee by the report of the superintendent at yesterday's meeting when he described the effect of the removal of the Beacon Bar. A recommendation will be sent to the council and a representative will meet the advisory navigation committee of the board of trade to secure their co-operation in presenting the request on the government. Bills for \$300 for two new propellers for the Governor Carleton were ordered paid.

MAYOR GAYNOR'S LEAP YEAR

ADVICE TO THE GIRLS

New York, Feb. 2.—Last year's possibilities and the proper time to pull eggs were among topics discussed by Mayor Gaynor in an address before 125 girls of the senior class in a public school.

"The tidy woman who knows how to sing a little, and dance a little, and jump through the hoops a little, if necessary, and knows how to cook—she is the woman worth having," said the mayor.

Other excerpts from his address to the girls:

"Be as pretty as you can."

"Be able to write a nice cursive letter."

"Don't trouble yourself about the future. You will come out all right."

"Learn how to make your own dresses and your own hats."

"Some women would rather go to work in a cigar factory than do housework. That is not right."

The mayor was shown an exhibition of cooking that some of the fourteen-year-old girls had done, and he asked them how long it would take them to cook him an egg.
