While the lack of sun and abundance of rain have had a deteriorating effect upon the table vegetables they have not hampered the hay growth, but the grass has spring up remarkably well and there is much promise of a bumper hay crop. Plenty of sun, strong and warm, is needed by the farmers on aid vegetation, as there has been enough rain for a while at least.


