#### BUILDING PLANS

#### YIELDING RESULTS

Fifteen Government Steamers new in Service—Plans For Sixty Vessels

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—The programme of ship construction undertaken by the Dominion government early in 1918 has yielded substantial results. To date fifteen ships have been delivered and are already in service under the direction of the Canadian National Railways. There have been twenty-five sailings, aggregating 116,000 tons of traffic. Voyages have been completed between the Atlantic seaboard and the United Kingdom, and from the Pacific Coast to Great Britain. Thirteen voyages have been completed between Canada and the West Indies and Cuba and to South America, and one to Newfoundland. A service is already under way to Australia and New Zealand, and it is possible that the first ship will be available at Vancouver on or about Dec. 1. Additional sailings will be inaugurated to London, Glasgow, Avonmouth and St. John's, Newfoundland.

When the present government ship-building programme is completed sixty vessels will be in service. These will have a dead-weight tonnage of about 82,500 tons.

The Dominion of Canada ships have brought some 35,000 tons of raw sugar from Cuba. A real shortage was averted by the national ships as no private-owned ships were available for the service.

#### 1,801 SHIPS LAUNCHED

Emergency Fleet Report Shows Three-day Average For Week

Washington, Oct. 29.—Averaging more than three a day, a total of twenty-two vessels were launched during the week ended, October 18, according to the weekly launching report of the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

Fifteen steel steamships built under contract to the Fleet Corporation, one requisitioned steel steamship, five wooden vessels and one concrete steamship, aggregating 117,000 deadweight tons, were launched during the week, making a total of 1,801 vessels launched to date.

Among the contract steel ships was the 13,000-ton passenger liner American Legion and the 10,000-ton freighter Eastern Knight. A 9,000-ton tank steamer and three cargo-carriers of the same tonnage were among the larger type launched during the week.

### British Government Will Lift the Bread Subsidy

Premier Lloyd George Makes Statement in Sheffield That Present Arrangements for Handling Flour Will be Done Away With Shortly.

The British government, according to a statement just issued by Premier Lloyd George, will soon lift the bread subsidy. Under present conditions the British government stands a loss of sixteen and seventeen shillings on every bag of flour sold to the English bakers. Now, according to the premier's statement, this subsidy will be done away with, and the process of bringing grain and flour to the consumer at low prices for the producers of wheat, but cheap bread to the consumer, will be made up nearly in its entirety by government relief of flour in France, Italy, Norway, Sweden and Denmark. In these latter countries bread is very high, and the government pays only nine pence for a four-pound loaf. This is cheaper than in Toronto, where a three-pound loaf sells for twenty-two cents. The manner and time for lifting the subsidy have been decided upon, but English authorities consider it unlikely that a sudden withdrawal will take place. The premier did not intimate any date, merely passing the question up by the word "shortly." Flour in Austria is now selling at 2-6 per pound.

A presentation of a purse of gold was made, after which Father Fraser thanked the teachers for their expressions of good will and the hearty cooperation he had always received from them, making a continuance of the same for his successor, Rev. Father Oram, who was present also. Father Fraser goes to succeed to join in the work of Rev. Joseph McDermott.
