

### A Coal Supply

The matter of a supply of coal for this locality is being considered by the Executive of the Government this week.

Arrangements have been made with the local coal dealers to handle the coal, and we strongly urge the Government not to delay sending Bay Roberts a supply.

Local needs should be considered before the needs of foreign steamers, two of which put into St. John's this week short of coal. One has already secured 400 tons of Admiralty coal stored in the bulk, moored near the south side of the harbor.

In view of the fact that there was an increase in Nova Scotia's output of coal in 1915 amounting to 80,000 tons, it is rather strange that an advance of 25c per ton should have taken place at the Cape Breton Mines last fall.

It was also a great blunder on somebody's part that sections of Newfoundland should be left so short of coal.

Two citizens of Bay Roberts who sent to Harbor Grace for coal this week had to pay at the rate of \$8.00 per ton and \$2 for getting a half ton hauled to Bay Roberts.

Conditions as regards coal could not be any worse in such war-devastated countries as Belgium, Serbia, etc.

Four or five weeks ago The Guardian, speaking for the people of this section, called the attention of the representatives of the District, Messrs. Piesott, Young and Parsons, to the scarcity of a supply of coal, and asked them to take the matter up with the

Government. We fear no attention was given to the matter. And here we are still, on the 28th of January, with not a ton of coal to be got. Fortunately a supply of wood is being brought out from the country on the cars, and this is relieving the situation in some instances.

The weather is cold, and there are at least two cold months ahead of us, and we trust the Government will make arrangements to send us a supply next week. The Premier assures us he will endeavor to do something to relieve the situation.

### Prohibition Recount

Recount proceedings were continued yesterday by Mr. Justice Johnson. The ballots in the remaining boxes being assorted, counting began. Bay de Verde District being the first District selected. 509 votes were counted showing 488 for and 21 against.

Three rejected ballots were also found in the box, and a discussion arose as to their validity, the arguments of counsel continuing till nearly 10.30 last night, when adjournment was taken. The rejected ballots showed one with the word "Yes" written, another with a short stroke, and the third with two crosses. Judge Johnson will probably give his decision this morning as to whether he will accept them or not, and then the count will be continued.—Daily News, Jan. 27.

### WAR NEWS

The Governor, Newfoundland: London, Jan. 28. Headquarters in France report active on both sides, and an enemy bomb store exploded. Aircraft also active with British supremacy maintained. Elsewhere after mine explosions and violent bombardment, the Germans attacked on a mile front west of Arras-Lens road, and were repulsed, except at two points, where they occupied part of the craters caused by explosion.

### NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signposts, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Cape, Cape Breton, connects with the Canadian Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 35 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.60.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—85 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Bay.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Offices on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the message may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

### General Post Office

Rates of Commission on Money Orders.

The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows:

For sums not exceeding \$10 - 5c  
Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 - 10c  
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$50 - 15c  
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$100 - 20c  
Over \$100 but not exceeding \$200 - 25c  
Over \$200 but not exceeding \$500 - 30c  
Over \$500 but not exceeding \$1000 - 35c  
Over \$1000 but not exceeding \$2000 - 40c  
Over \$2000 but not exceeding \$5000 - 45c  
Over \$5000 but not exceeding \$10000 - 50c

Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but no more may be obtained as the remittance requires.
