Bellingham, Wash., May 9.-The nightlest avalanches ever seen in the Mount Baker district have tobogganed the mountains and swept the valleys of that region this year. Repeatedly enormous masses of snow and debris have rolled down the mountains leaving in their wake great clouds of dus nd snow, and cutting swaths in the orest many yards wide.
