AVALANCHES IN WASHINGTON

HINDU OUTBREAK IS IMMINENT

Large Number of Troops and Police Now on Duty in Lahore.

Lahore, British India, May 9.—Everything seems to point to the imminence of a Hindu outbreak here, and the authorities are taking all the steps necessary to suppress it by force of arms.

The political situation is hourly assuming a graver aspect. Bands of stalwart rustics, armed with bludgeons who have been enlisted by the leaders of the seditious movement are crowding into the native city, and troops of all arms and bodies of police, mounted and on foot, are being drafted into the city of Lahore from all parts of the province.

The Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab, Sir Daniel Gifford, is taking active measures to prevent any possible outbreak. He has issued a proclamation prohibiting meetings of every kind, and solemnly warning the public not to attend any assemblies under pain of severe punishment.

In addition to this the Lieut.-Governor has struck at the root of the revolutionary movement by ordering the arrest this afternoon of a lawyer, Lalpatra, who practiced in the chief court of Punjab, and who was the leader, financier and organizer of most of the seditious demonstrations and revolutionary riots in the Punjab.

Immediately after being taken into custody Lalpatra was deported to another province. His arrest caused a profound sensation among the Hindus, who hitherto had believed that the authorities would not dare to take such drastic action.

Another revolutionary leader for whose arrest a warrant has been issued received an intimation of the action taken by the authorities. He escaped from Lahore and is now in hiding.

ALLEGED FORGER. F. Larawa, who fled from Albany White Undr Ball, is Brought Back.

New York, May 9.—Frederick Larawa, who fled to Europe from Albany while under bail on a charge of forgery, was brought here to-day on the steamer Majestic, in custody of District Attorney Addington and Detective Hiram Walker, of Albany.

Larawa was a clerk in the office of the city treasurer at Albany in February, 1905, and is charged with the forgery of foreign tax receipts amounting to several thousand dollars.
