What a Well Known Authority Has to Say on the Difference Between English and U. S. Athletes.

ENGLISH ATHLETES ALWAYS IN

Horan, another of our distance runners, frequently runs in very fast time, although now in business. The end of English sport is cheerfulness and enjoyment, and the seriousness with which you Americans take your game is unknown.

"The most obvious sport for comparison in methods is track athletics. Americans are superior in all events requiring technique, while the English are stronger in endurance. This fact is very well illustrated by the high jump. We have as many different styles as there are jumpers, while in America the underlying principle, as I understand it, is the same for every man—he runs straight at the bar, takes off at a certain distance from the bar, after a given number of steps, and then, by a seeming shiver, jerks his hip out of the way and lands on the other side, facing the direction from which he has ran. Howard Smith, the Cambridge Jumper, made a trip to this country and was able to better his jump two inches as a result, so that he succeeded in defeating his Oxford rival.

"The majority of our tracks are one-third mile, while the high hundle races are run on turf courses ever stationary hurdles. I well remember when your great hurdler, Kraenskein, came to our country, that he refused to run until the hurdles had been fitted in the American mode.
