It is announced that Blair has resigned his seat for St. John in the commons. This announcement is not necessary, as Blair has vacated his seat by virtue of apcepting a commission to investigate into the workings of the inter-state commission. It is said Blair will address the electors of St. John by letter in the course of a few days.

John and Halifax, arrived at Liverpool yesterday.

The Alian line str. Pretorian, Capt. Johnson, from Liverpool via Halifax, arrived in the harbor at an early hour last evening, and docked at No. 2 berth about 8, o'clock. The Pretorian landed there 35 second cabin passengers and 123 steerage people. The destinations of the lot would land about half of them in the United States and the other part in Western Canada. Only six people were held over and the rest proceeded west before midnight. The Pretorian will discharge at her berth 1,750 tons of cargo for St. John and the west.

#### INJURED AT HAMPTON.

HAMPTON, Dec. 28.—The wife of Sergeant Kilpatrick of the St. John police staff, arrived here by the east-bound accommodation train this afternoon on her way to St. Martins.

The C. P. R. train was following close behind and after taking on water at the tank the accommodation ran up the track to go on the siding. Finding the train had gone past the platform, Mrs. Kilpatrick rushed out of the car and jumped off, falling heavily on the hard frozen ground beside the track. Several persons ran to her help, but she was able to walk back to the station. Shortly after she was taken across to Miss Cochrane's boarding house, where she was attended to by Dr. Wetmore. Here serjous symptoms were manifested and she passed into fits of unconsciousness with the appearance of partial paralysis. Nurse Travis was sent for and looked carefully after her welfare and a despatch was sent to her husband, who arrived by the maritime express. There was a bad cut on the back of her head, which Dr. Wetmore closed with plaster. She was also bleeding from one ear as though from internal injury. She was placed in bed and is receiving every attention.
