HIGH COURT L. O. F.

EDMONTON, N. B., July 6.—Yesterday Foresters from all over the province congregated at this town to attend the High Court of the L. O. F., which is holding its twenty-first annual convention. Last evening the convention opened with the High Chief Ranger, Dr. B. M. Mullin, of Fredericton, in the chair. The High Chief Ranger in a speech reviewed the work of the past year.

F. W. Emmerson, the High Secretary, submitted a financial statement, showing a surplus of assets amounting to \$3,495.71. For the year ending May 31 \$3,287.47 was paid out in death benefits.

E. P. Eastman, the High Treasurer, in his report, showed that \$3,888.63 had been paid out in summary disbursements.

The High Auditors, J. V. Russell and Thomas Murray, also submitted the audit of the society's accounts.

SLEIGH-DAY.

At five o'clock yesterday afternoon Miss Letta Day, daughter of the late George W. Day, was married to George Douglas Sleigh of Springfield, Mass. The marriage took place in the German street Baptist church and was performed by Rev. G. O. Gates. The bride was married in her travelling costume of navy blue broadcloth. Owing to recent deaths in the families of the two contracting parties the wedding was a quiet one. Mr. and Mrs. Sleigh left on the evening train for a trip to Montreal and Quebec. They will reside in Springfield, where Mr. Sleigh is employed in the large department store of Forbes & Wallace.

ROBT. T. CORNELL.

The death is announced of Robert T. Cornell, who is well known in business and newspaper circles. He came here a few years ago and succeeded in making many friends by his genial spirit and kindness. He was on the staff of the Gazette for a few years and later with the Telegraph. The time of his death he was with the People's Life Insurance Co. He leaves a widow and one son, Julian T. Cornell, who is with W. Malcolm Mackay.

CIRCLAS OF FLAMES.

LEFAX, N. S., July 5.—Fire started in the woods back of the town of Lefax, N. S., yesterday. The fire spread rapidly and threatened the destruction of that section of the town as well as the Nova Scotia Steel Company's house and coke bank, which lay directly in its path.

Sydney and North Sydney were wired for assistance, but Sydney had all its own forces, which, co-operating with the steel company's force, fought the flames at the company's new house.

The Sydney Mines hotel, valued at \$5,000, was destroyed, and seven other houses were burned. Only a small portion of the furniture was saved.

The town proper is not in danger, as the wind is blowing away from it. The Nova Scotia Steel Company's coke yard caught, but the fire was extinguished before it had made headway.

BOSTON BLAZE.

BOSTON, July 5.—The immense grain elevator of the Boston & Maine Railroad Co., one of the largest in the world, together with freight houses 1, 2 and 3 on piers 1 and 2, Mystic wharf, Charlestown, were burned to-night, entailing a loss that will exceed \$1,000,000.

Some lives are supposed to have been sacrificed as sailors of the Allan steamer Astorian, which was lying at pier 1, and who with 24 fellow seamen jumped overboard to save themselves from the flames, which had communicated to their vessel. Olga Jensen, boatwain's mate, and Patrick Fishan, fireman, are among the supposed victims. The body of James Flynn was recovered from the harbor at tonight.

B. S. VANCOUVER STILL FAST.

(Special to the Sun.) MONTREAL, July 5.—Another attempt was made this morning to get the stranded str. Vancouver out of the mud of Lake St. Peter, in which she rests, but with no more success than met with previous attempts. The passengers are to be forwarded to their destinations on the Allan steamer Fredericton, which sails in the morning. They have already lost four days. The Vancouver will have to be dredged out of the position in which she lies.

BRIGANTINE SUNK.

QUEBEC, July 5.—The Dominion liner steamer Dominion, from Liverpool, reports having been in collision with and sinking the Danish brigantine steamer, Captain Hansen, lumber laden, bound for a British port. The collision occurred on the morning of July 4 in a dense fog in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the bows of the Komer being stove in. The Dominion was not seriously damaged and laid to and took up the crew of the Komer, seven in all.

The Komer was then set on fire, so that she would not become a menace to navigation.

MONCTON NEWS.

MONCTON, July 5.—Theophilus B. Leblanc, a well known contractor, died at his home, Lager's Corner, near Moncton, this afternoon, of paralysis, aged 55. Deceased had some large contracts in Sheldiff last summer, and while engaged in them had a stroke of paralysis on the left side. He had recovered sufficiently to be about, but had another stroke a few days ago on his right side, which it was seen at once must end fatally. He leaves a widow, three sons and two daughters. His sons are William, Blair and Lebaron, all of Moncton, and daughters Mrs. Joseph A. Dossique and Florence at home. Deceased was for many years engaged in the hotel business in Moncton, but for the last few years had devoted all his time to farming and contracting.

Harry Kowick of the Montreal branch of the Record Foundry and Machine Company, was married here this evening to Miss Annie Peters. The ceremony took place at the residence of the bride's sister, Mrs. Dr. B. F. Reade.

FREDERICTON NEWS.

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 5.—A most horrible accident occurred this afternoon when the seven-year-old son of John Kane, painter, was instantly killed. While attempting to ride on a sloven he fell between the wheels. The hind wheels passed over the head of the unfortunate lad and his skull was crushed. Allen Howard was driver of the team, but no blame is attached to him for the unfortunate occurrence. Dr. Davidson has written the president of the university refusing to withdraw his resignation. A meeting of the senate is called for the 15th inst. to consider his letters and take action. Halifax defeated local players here today in tennis, but the home team put up a good fight and the finish was very close.

67 STILL MISSING.

ABERDEEN, Scotland, July 5.—Another boatload containing 17 survivors of the ill-fated Danish steamship Nerze, which foundered off Rockall Reef, 250 miles from the Scottish mainland on June 25, were landed at Aberdeen, Scotland, tonight by the steam trawler Largo Bay. Six hundred and twenty-seven are still missing.

GEE MUST HANG.

OTTAWA, July 5.—Lord Minto has approved of an order-in-council allowing the law to take its course in the case of George Gee, now in Woodstock, N. B., jail under sentence of death for the murder of Millie Gee, his cousin. The unfortunate is 22 years of age and his victim whom he murdered in a fit of jealousy was only 19 years old at the time of the murder, March 11th, last.

George Gee will be executed on July 22nd at Woodstock jail.
