FOUR BOYS WHO DID NOT LIKE BEING SENT TO JAIL.

North End Youngsters, Charged With Throwing Snowballs, Were Given a Good Scare.

There was only one drunk on the police court bench this morning, and he went to jail for ten days in default of paying a four dollar fine.

A little red-faced immigrant boy who has been adopted by Captain Peter McIntyre of the North End and who drives the delivery wagon was the complainant against four boys who threw snowballs at him, and also struck him on the mouth and cut his lip. The boys acknowledged throwing snowballs. They were all under 10 years of age and accompanied in court by parents.

The four ranged up before the magistrate's desk in the following order: Robert Finley, George Campbell, William Finley and Joseph Elliott. It seemed as though the quartette that they should not be from school and that Saturday was schoolboys' day in court.

EXHIBITION BUILDING WILL BE USED AS RINK. Marathons Assume Responsibility for Any Damage Which May Be Done—Meeting Held Today.

The committee composed of Mayor Sears, Ald. Bullock, Vanwart and Christie, appointed by the common council to meet with officials of the Marathon Athletic Club concerning that organization being allowed to have the use of the exhibition building for ice sports, met in City Hall this morning.

Frank White and H. F. S. Paisley represented the Marathons. Mr. White stated that the club wished to be allowed the use of the exhibition building in order that Canada's national winter sport might be given in St. John this winter.

An agreement was drawn up which stated that the club would be responsible for all damage done. All present expressed themselves in favor of giving the club the use of the building, and as a result hockey will boom in St. John this winter.

IN THE COURTS

Carleton Fishermen Get \$50 Damages From the Schooner Helen Mitchell.

The special sitting of the circuit court, which was to have opened this morning, was delayed until the afternoon at 2:30 on account of the absence of Judge Gregory, who was a passenger on the Atlantic express.

In the county court chambers before Judge Forbes this morning the case of Sloan and Vall vs. Wry was heard. The plaintiffs in the case are owners of some fish weirs at Carleton, and they allege that the schooner Helen Mitchell, commanded by Capt. Wry, damaged their weirs by running into them.

The suit was brought to recover damages.

H. A. McKeown, K. C., for the defendant made application to have the case postponed on account of the defendant not being able to attend because of illness. The application was denied, and the case was tried. No defense was offered and a verdict of \$50 was awarded to the plaintiffs. J. B. M. Baxter for the plaintiffs and H. A. McKeown, K. C., for the defendant.

In the probate court this morning the accounts of the estate of the late Caroline Willis were settled. An application was made by Robert Willis, administrator, to have some additions made to the inventory. This was opposed by Mrs. Ellison, administratrix. ASK TOO MUCH FOR ELECTRICAL POWER

James Pender Says Grand Falls Co. Figures are High

Steam Power Can be Produced in St. John at Considerably Less Than Amount Suggested by New Company.

James Pender is one man in town who has gone into the question of the cost of production of steam power more deeply than any other manufacturer. He has repeatedly made estimates of the cost of power in the Pender Mill Works, and within the last few weeks has carefully gone over the figures. In consequence of this, Mr. Pender's opinion on the attractiveness of the offer made by the Grand Falls Power Co. is of some value.

Speaking to the Star today, after reading the figures quoted by the company, Mr. Pender expressed the opinion that they were far from being sufficiently low to induce any large manufacturers in St. John to change from steam to electricity. The Grand Falls people state that in case will the charge be higher than \$50 and \$40 per horse power for 24 hour and 10 hour service respectively on plants of from 100 to 500 horse-power.

A few weeks ago, when a representative of the company was in the city, Mr. Pender's opinion on the attractiveness of the offer made by the Grand Falls Power Co. is of some value. TALK OF STARTING A SNOWSHOE CLUB

Marathons Will Consider This Proposition at Their Next Regular Meeting.

The executive of the Marathons is intended shall exercise supervision over the whole, but to a certain degree the two will be independent. The ladies will be asked to organize, and probably to contribute to the general fund a portion of their annual fees, the regulars being retained to defray the cost of any entertainment which may be provided.

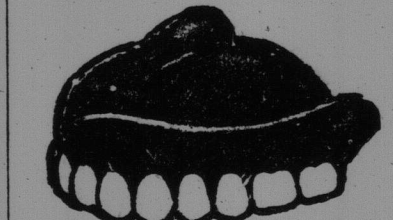

Three Inches of Snow on the Ground—Cold Weather Likely to Continue

Winter is here, and judging from present indications, the snow which fell yesterday will stay and good sleighing will be had for several days. The storm started yesterday morning about ten o'clock. The snow fell in scattered flurries up to two o'clock, when a regular blast set in.

A heavy gale from the northeast was blowing and in some places the snow drifted into piles three feet deep. The highest velocity of the wind was forty miles an hour. The temperature was very low and at one time yesterday the mercury nearly reached the zero mark.
