The High School track and field sports took place Saturday afternoon on the Victoria grounds. 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GLENCAIRN IV. AND MONA THE WINNERS

The racing season opened for the R. K. Y. C. on Saturday, with two races, one for Class C and F boats, the other for salmon boats. The Glencairn IV, owned by W. B. Ganong, of Moncton, won the first race under protest, and John Frodsham's salmon boat Mona, captured the second race. There was a heavy wind blowing all the afternoon and most of the yachts on the water were reefed. Notwithstanding the frequent showers a large number were on hand to see the race. There were three boats entered in the C and F race, the Glencairn IV, owned by W. B. Ganong; the Edgar H. Fairweather's Helena, and the Phantom, owned by A. J. Machum. The boats got over the line with the Helena in the lead. The Glencairn IV had a slight advantage from the start and rapidly increased the lead while sailing to windward. The Phantom kept in second place, the Helena following. After sailing as far as Sand Point the Helena and Phantom dropped out of the race. The Glencairn IV, with the line a winner, maintained that they had rounded the buoy all right. The judges were following the race on the Wharfedale and were jolted by the competing yachts when the buoy was reached. It was flat on the water, having been blown down by the wind. The protest will be decided upon by the sailing committee. There is no rule in the R. K. Y. C. to govern this case, but the rulings of the Royal Yachting Association which are followed in a case of this kind, will be considered. A case similar to the present one, was decided by the Association in 1871, when five boats were competing. The turning buoy was gone and the decision of the sailing committee was upheld.
