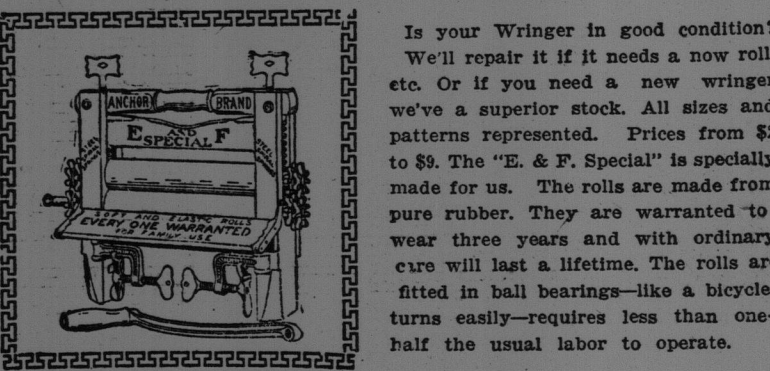

LUMBER SHIPPERS MEET WITH HEAVY LOSSES

Slump in the English Market Seriously Felt. It is Stated That One Man Has Already Lost Not Less Than \$50,000 and the End is Not Yet

The lumber industry in New Brunswick is now experiencing the best manufacturing and worst selling season in a number of years. Conditions have arisen during the past few months which have resulted in heavy losses to some of the largest shippers, and from present indications the depression will continue during the remainder of the summer at least. The English market has dropped two dollars and a half per thousand feet and as a result it is estimated that one shipper has lost not less than \$50,000 this season, another in the vicinity of \$20,000, while the rest stand to drop all the profits made on early cargoes or else to suffer a great reduction from their ordinary profits.

LATEST WEATHER REPORT. FAIR and WARM

DEER PAID A VISIT TO MONCTON CHINA SHOP

Raced Through a Store and Out of a Back Window, Doing Scarcely Any Damage—Moose and Bears are Also Seen

RUIN IS FEARED IN ST. JOHN VALLEY

Intervale Lands are Almost Under Water. Thousands of Tons of Hay Threatened—Oats and Potatoes are Being Destroyed by Excessive Rains

The intervales along the St. John river which supply practically all the farmers in the upper parts of Queens county and adjoining districts with hay are seriously threatened by existing weather and water conditions. The river is now so high that great areas of intervale land are almost under water and within twenty-four hours, if the present rain continues, will be flooded. Thatch Island, which is on the main river about three miles from Jemseg is already partially submerged, and eight inches of water will put the whole island out of sight. The island is one of the best hay growing pieces of land in the district, and the standing crop was bought in this year for the largest price on record. Farmers bid in this hay and their prices regulate the general price to a certain extent. On this island and on the Queens county intervales it is estimated that fully three thousand tons of hay are in danger. If, however, the flood should extend along river as far as Maugeville the loss will be immensely greater, and scores of farmers will be ruined, for they will be unable to get any hay elsewhere. As a rule the farmers are through with their haying by this time of year but in the present season the hay is later than usual and recent growth of all products has been so scanty that no other crops are ready for cutting and something must be neglected. Everything is coming at once, and heavy losses will be the result. More than this, the continued wet weather is ruining the oats and potatoes. Rust and rot have appeared in all sections and unless lighter weather soon comes the crops will be practically destroyed. There is as yet no indication that the rain is over, and the river continues to rise. Briefly, conditions to the St. John valley, the most fertile section of New Brunswick, are extremely grave.
