C.P.R. IS RAPIDLY  
FILLING THE PLACES

Maintaining an Unbroken  
Service in Spite of the  
Strike

C. P. R. COMMENDED

WINNIPEG, Aug. 14.—At a well  
attended meeting of the Winnipeg Grain  
and Produce Exchange in Winnipeg  
this morning the following resolution  
was unanimously passed:

"That the Winnipeg Grain and  
Produce Exchange commend the action of  
the Canadian Pacific Railway Com-  
pany in agreeing at once to carry out  
the award of the board of conciliation  
in the matter of dispute between that  
company and their shop men, and re-  
gret that the shop men not only refused  
to carry out the award but have ac-  
tually gone on strike.

"That the Canadian Pacific Railway  
Company are very rapidly filling the  
places of the strikers throughout the  
West and have apparently managed to  
maintain an unbroken service.

EXHIBITION MAN  
IS UNDER ARREST

Colonel Leslie Charged With  
the Theft of  
\$18,946

BAIL IS REFUSED

TORONTO, Aug. 14.—Somewhat of a  
sensation was caused in the police  
court this morning when Colonel Deni-  
son ordered the arrest of Col. J. Knox  
Leslie, former treasurer of the Na-  
tional Exhibition and refused to grant  
bail. The cause of the arrest was that  
Leslie had refused to produce exhibi-  
tion bank passbook when requested to  
do so by his official chief, Manager  
Orr. Leslie's indictment was also al-  
tered to a charge of theft of \$18,946.53  
instead of \$10,000, as formerly. Colonel  
Denison refused to consider the  
granting of bail until the pass book  
was produced, and adjourned the case  
till Monday. After some hours' legal  
sparring, Leslie finally handed over the  
book and his bond was renewed.

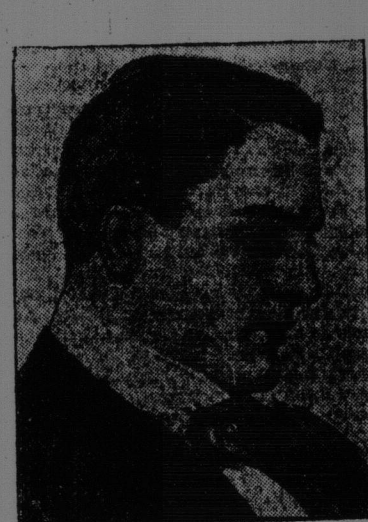

bridge a few nights ago by attempting  
to drop into the river, has again made

herself conspicuous by trying to clean

Last night she again indulged in  
strong drink until she lost all control

tempted to bar her way, but all to no  
avail. She swore and threatened them  
with her fists. Several hard blows  
were administered on some of the peo-

under the railing of the Suspension  
bridge, but was prevented from carry-

No Tendency to Dis-  
figure Lawns

More seats are urgently needed in  
King square if that breathing spot is

cessful which occupied all the available  
seats and thronged the paths at the

be given in the evening, but those who  
gathered to hear the music showed no

than the day. The absence of enough

paths greater than it should be.
