Maintaining an Unbroken Service in Spite of the Strike

C. P. R. COMMENDED

WINNIPEG, Aug. 14.—At a well-attended meeting of the Winnipeg Grain and Produce Exchange in Winnipeg this morning the following resolution was unanimously passed:

"That the Winnipeg Grain and Produce Exchange commend the action of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company in agreeing at once to carry out the award of the board of conciliation in the matter of dispute between that company and their shop men, and regret that the shop men not only refused to carry out the award but have actually gone on strike.

"That the Canadian Pacific Railway Company are very rapidly filling the places of the strikers throughout the West and have apparently managed to maintain an unbroken service.

CROWD ON SQUARE WAS WELL BEHAVED

No Tendency to Disfigure Lawns

More seats are urgently needed in King square if that breathing spot is to continue to attract hundreds of people the evenings on which band concerts are given. Last night the concert given in the new band stand by the City Council has proved that since which occupied all the available seats and thronged the paths at the centre of the square to such an extent that they were almost blocked. The lack of seats forced many persons who had become tired of walking or standing to seat themselves on the grass at the edges of the paths. The crowd showed a marked tendency to get as close to the band as possible and to stay there, although the numerous paths of the square afforded an excellent chance of moving about and at the same time of hearing the music to the greatest advantage.

Last night's concert was the first to be given in the evening, but those who gathered to hear the music showed no more tendency to disfigure the square or to destroy the flowers than they did at the afternoon concert. There was a strong force of police present, and the policemen all reported that the crowd was extremely well-behaved and showed little or no tendency to walk upon the grass. The few who did trespass were speedily moved off the turf. The policemen themselves commented on the fact that the absence of enough seats to accommodate a portion of the crowd made the congestion of the paths greater than it should be.
