

News Summary.

DOMINION. -The revenue of Canada, for the four months ending November 1st, amounted to \$13,000,000, being \$1,125,000 in excess of the same period last year.

-A suit to recover \$25,000 damages for libel has been begun by the firm of John Widdow & Co., Montreal, against John Douglas & Son, proprietors of the Daily Witness, which recently published an article reflecting on the sanitary condition of the firm's tomato canning factory.

-At the annual meeting of the Fredericton Park Association, the secretary's report showed a total loss of \$1,000 on the property.

-John Palmer, of Dorchester, who celebrated his 100th birthday a few weeks ago, has just received a renewal of his passport.

-The C. P. R. exhibition car way to be in Lévis yesterday the 20th, then following the line of the Intercolonial, it will proceed to day at St. Thomas, the 22nd at Lévis, the 23rd at St. Jean Fort Joli, the 24th at Rivière Ouelle and Monday forenoon at Rivière du Loup, the 26th November. Thence it will come down the line of the Temiscouata railway into New Brunswick.

-In the Supreme Court at Ottawa, judgment in the case of the Maritime Bank vs. Troop is reserved.

-The government have increased the export duty on pine logs and timber from \$2 to \$3 per thousand feet. This increase of fifty per cent will, it is hoped, lead to the manufacture in Canada of logs which are now shipped in large quantities to the United States mills.

-The Winnipeg City market building, in the rear of the City Hall has been burned. The butchers' stalls were completely destroyed, and but a small portion of the building itself was left standing. Loss is about \$26,800.

-Lerroy is said to have made its appearance among the Indians of British Columbia, to whom it was transmitted by the Chiches.

-There is much disappointment among Canadian contractors over the award by the Dominion government of Gallop Rapids contract, amounting to eight hundred thousand dollars, and Sault Ste. Marie Canal contract, one and a quarter million dollars, to a syndicate composed largely of United States contractors.

-The tug New City is to carry the mails between Digby and Annapolis for the present, leaving St. John every Monday, Wednesday and Saturday, returning same day.

-The C. P. R. Telegraph Co. is expected to open an office in Fredericton about Christmas.

-The underwriters of Montreal have refused to comply with the request of the city council to reduce the rate of fire insurance premiums.

-The customs duty on the Mary A. Troop's cargo of sugar for the Moncton refinery will be in the vicinity of \$60,000.

-The Prince Edward Island potato crop is a fair average one this season.

-Deposits in the St. John Savings Bank for October were \$71,779 and the payments \$84,798.47.

-George O. G., late Judge of Probate of King's Co., N. B., is dead.

-The "Secret" has been taken off the Bay route and sent to Portland, Me.

-Schr. John Thomas, from Pugwash for Port Mulgrave, with hay and lumber, was run into by an unknown schooner in the Strait of Canso on Thursday midnight, and badly damaged. Her crew were taken off by the colliding schooner and landed on shore.

-The Manitoba government has ceased work on the Portage extension for the winter and western Manitoba farmers have no chance of being relieved from monopoly this year.

-Lord Stanley is trying to inaugurate a series of free lectures on popular subjects for the benefit of the Ottawa working people.

-Paschal Pascal, an Italian, aged 28 met with a painful accident in the St. Lawrence sugar refinery. He was engaged at his work when a pan of boiling sugar fell upon him and his body, legs and arms were frightfully scalded. He is not expected to recover.

-John Hugh Gillespie has discovered a 14 inch seam of coal on Mill Brook within a quarter of a mile of the post office. P. Roberts, C. M., N. S., and has taken a mining lease of five square miles of territory between Parrboro and Black Rock, including the place where the seam was found.

Literary Notes.

The Presbyterian Review for October is a massive number. The first article, by Dr. Parson, on "The Influence of Paganism on Post-Apostolic Christianity," is elaborate, discriminating, and scholarly.

Dr. Shedd discusses the "Imprecability of Christ," and deals with that difficult problem how he could be obvious of temptation and still it not be possible for him to sin.

Dr. Warfield gives a very complete and exhaustive sketch of "Darwin's Religious Life," from an examination of all the material available. Dr. Douglas gives a critical review of Chayne's and Driver's views of the authorship of Isaiah.

The Editorial Notes are upon the anniversaries of various Presbyterian bodies and other gatherings. This Review has one of the fullest review departments of any of the quarters. The present number is fully up to the high average maintained by this orthodox periodical.

The Baptist Quarterly Review for October contains five articles and the usual departments. Dr. H. Osgood shows that the resurrection of the body is taught in the Pentateuch. The ancient records of Egypt and Chaldee show that these peoples held to this doctrine at the time of Abraham, and that it was familiar to the patriarchs.

This fact reveals references to this doctrine where otherwise they would not be clearly seen. Dr. W. N. Clark shows from the Memoirs of Darwin, how this great man was limited by want of the religious faculty, and the consequent impossibility to make the broadest and highest generalizations of the facts he studied out so carefully.

R. S. W. Culver exhibits the symbolism of the Old Testament sacrifices in a homiletic way. Dr. Willmorth's article on "Women's Work in the Church" is on a live topic, which he treats vigorously and fearlessly. He thinks that many of the present methods of women's work are an original and unwomanly. The most elaborate article is that of Rev. G. F. Gearing of "God the Son in the Moral Government of the World." The Editorial Department deals in live issues; the Homiletic is adapted to afford practical help to preachers; while that of Review, although inferior compared with the elaborate corresponding department of such quarters as the Presbyterian Review and the Biblical Sacra, is respectable.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN.

Three thousand socialists met in Hyde park, on the 11th, to observe the anniversary of the execution of the Chicago anarchists and to denounce the suppression of free speech in Trafalgar square.

Owing to the increased traffic on its railways, the Prussian government has ordered the construction of 7,000 new goods wagons, and hired 1,500 wagons from abroad. It will also ask the Landtag to vote 45,000,000 marks for the purpose of increasing the rolling stock of the railways.

Rains have fallen in Western and Eastern India; the crop prospects are consequently improved.

The Marquis of Lansdowne, governor general of India, has started for Calcutta.

In the parliamentary election at Doncaster, Yorkshire, on the 16th, Oldroyd, Gladstone's ally, carried off 6,071 votes and Arnold Forster, unionist, 3,961.

Major Scheibert urges a partial abolition of fortresses on the French frontier which are merely obstructive. In the event of war, he says, France would mass her troops and the contest would be decided by pitched battles.

Parliament was questioned on Monday with reference to the appointment of a successor to Lord Sackville West at Washington, and next Thursday the fisheries dispute will be brought up.

There has been a gale, very severe in the northern part of Ireland, where much damage was done to property. At Belfast the wind blew with frightful force and several vessels were wrecked at the entrance of Belfast harbor.

The Pasteur Institute, Paris, was formally opened on the 14th in the presence of President Carnot, several government ministers, foreign ambassadors and Russian grand dukes. M. Pasteur received an ovation from the people.

A powerful American syndicate is about to be formed at St. Petersburg for the purpose of building railroads in Siberia. The engineer in charge of the project will give 4,000,000 roubles yearly for the transportation of mails and convicts.

Messengers arrived at Wady Halfa report that the mysterious white path in Bahr El Gazelle district fought a great battle and killed many dervishes.

The French chamber of deputies committee on revision of the constitution has adopted resolutions in favor of abolishing the senate and the presidency.

It is reported that Henry Arthur Blake, once appointment as governor of Queensland, received 6,071 votes and Arnold Forster, unionist, 3,961.

On Thursday morning, while the Rochester express on the Hudson River road was at the Esplanade depot, New York, a freight train came along from the South and dived into the rear of the passenger train. The engine and several passenger cars were wrecked and the freight coming and started his train ahead. The collision occurred fifty yards above the station. The rear of the last coach was smashed and all of the windows in the cars were broken. The engineer and fireman of the freight train jumped before the collision and saved their lives. Mrs. Edward S. Shivel (7) of St. John, N. B., jumped from the car and fractured her skull. She died in an hour.

A shock of earthquake, sharp enough to cause many people in hotels and private houses to run out into the streets, was felt in San Francisco, on Sunday. Its direction was southwest to south and its duration ten seconds. The shock was felt throughout Central California.

The Canadian Kurir, which arrived at New York on Sunday, experienced one of the worst passages in her history. On the 13th a tidal wave swept over the boat and killed Geo. Arnold, a seaman. Five others were more or less severely injured. The passengers were terribly shaken up. Fierce gales and mighty seas met the vessel, which nevertheless made good time—a little over seven days.
