KNIGHTS AND LADIES ENJOY RIVER SALES
THE MEN OF ST. JOHN GIVE A STRING EXHIBIT
MASS MEETING YESTERDAY IN IMPERIAL THEATRE—ORGANIZED TO RAISE CONTRIBUTION TOWARDS HOSPITAL SHIP FUND AND OTHERWISE HELP CANADA'S SOLDIERS WHO GO TO THE FRONT.

Enthusiasm, tempered with a sense of the solemnity of the occasion, marked the mass meeting of St. John's Knights and Ladies of the Imperial Theatre yesterday afternoon, to consider methods of helping the Canadian soldiers who are going on overseas service. In the most needed help he could not be reached. Many Canadian ladies had sent the Canadian soldiers who went to South Africa comfort bags, but mostly they were too big, and had to be abandoned when the men left the ship. When a soldier carried the equipment provided by the military authorities he had all he could carry. Ladies of St. John sent out many comfort bags which never reached the men. On service they only got a little mail occasionally. Col. Armstrong said he saw at Cape Town on his return from the Transvaal great piles of comfort sent out by ladies with the idea they would reach the soldiers.

The Soldiers' Great Need
A soldier needed money most when he was in a hospital, and if the ladies wanted to send money they should send it to the doctors or some other officers who would see it was used to assist wounded men. He said Miss Black of Halifax who had sent the Canadian soldiers heavy woolen socks had provided one of the most acceptable gifts which could be sent to men on active service.

The motion of Lady Tilley was then put and carried by a standing vote. His worship then read a letter from Dr. Murray MacLaren expressing regret that an emergency case at the hospital prevented him from being present as he hoped to speak on the work of the Red Cross Society.

Mrs. T. H. Bullock announced that the New Brunswick Society of Graduate Nurses had subscribed \$25 towards the hospital ship.

Expect to Raise \$1,000
Mrs. Geo. McA. Blizard reported that the local chapters of the Daughters of the Empire had over \$8 canvassed work in the city, and expected to raise \$1,000 or more.

Mrs. Blizard said that as a sample of the way the appeal had been received, Paul Longley, of the Dominion Trust Company, had offered to take charge of all money received, all book-keeping work in connection with the campaign, while Messrs. Lockhart and Swansburg had offered to organize an orchestra to help in the work.

Women's Canadian Club Donates \$200
Mrs. H. A. Powell announced that the Women's Canadian Club had donated \$200.

Capt. Harrison and Dr. Stewart Skinner spoke briefly, commending the work of the ladies.

W. H. Golding then read a telegram announcing that the Germans were in retreat before the British Empire, and an announcement which was greeted with applause.

A bevy of young girls dressed in white, who had gone among the audience with British flags, arranged in the form of a bag, then came to the platform and presented them to the Mayor, filled with money they had collected from the gathering.

Mrs. Bullock in reply to a question, said that it was the intention to raise money not only for a hospital ship, but to help the soldiers generally.

D. B. Bridgen, then sang "O England," accompanied by Mrs. G. McA. Blizard, and after a vote of thanks were tendered W. H. Golding for the service of the Imperial Theatre the gathering sang God Save the King and adjourned.

AN EMBRYO REBELLION IN ECUADOR
(Special cable to The Standard thro' Central News Agency)
Guayaquil, Ecuador, Aug. 12.—Troops have been sent into the coast province of Manabí to quell an uprising. It is believed the rebellion will be speedily subdued. Congress met and selected Alfred Baquerizo Moreno for president. Austin Cabanizas was chosen president of the House of Deputies. The interests of country are affected adversely by the conflict in Europe.

U.S. STANDS TO LOOSE MONEY BY THE WAR
Washington, Aug. 12.—How to raise something like \$100,000,000 to equip a hospital ship and the national president of the women's council had sent a telegram to the council in St. John, asking for the women of Canada to raise \$100,000 by August 15th to equip a hospital ship. Before receiving this telegram officers of the local council of women had conferred as to what they might do in the circumstances and been informed that the Daughters of the Empire had taken steps to raise money for a hospital ship. It had been decided that the ladies had a considerable fund for the purpose and might be called to consider what might be done.

Mrs. Bullock then read messages from Mrs. Wood, wife of the lieutenant-governor of the province, and Mrs. E. A. Smith expressing regret at inability to be present, but stating they were working to assist the movement to equip a hospital ship.

Lady Tilley then arose and in a brief speech moved the resolution quoted above.

Mrs. Lawrence seconded the motion, saying it was another nail to keep the old flag flying at the masthead.

St. John Helped in Other Times of Need
Col. H. H. McLean, who was then called to the stage by the mayor, said every man would appreciate the action taken by the ladies, whose promptitude was an example to the men. During the South African campaign New Brunswick had raised a considerable fund for the soldiers. St. John in this matter setting an example not only to the province but to the rest of Canada. Out of this fund they had been able to pay each New Brunswick soldier fifty cents a day extra, and had raised a considerable fund for the comfort and sympathy for the soldiers' families.

Col. McLean suggested that the women of the city should organize on a military basis to carry out their plans of helping the soldiers and their families.

Col. H. H. Armstrong of the 3rd Regiment Canadian Artillery was then called to the stage, accompanied by his adjutant Col. W. A. Harrison, and Dr. Stewart Skinner. Col. Armstrong said he would speak to the question before the meeting as a man who had had experience as a private soldier.
