Ottawa, March 13.-The midnight casualty list indicates that part of the Canadian corps was in action on Mar. 2, when the British regained a half mile of trenches from the Germans on the Ypres-Comines front. Several members of the 18th Battalion are reported killed in action or wounded on that date, which bears out the impression in military circles here that the infantry, as well as the artillery, had a share in the victory, as the Canadian corps was known to be operating in that region.

The list issued tonight contains the name of one of the 55th Battalion, Harris G. Read, Upper Rockport, N. B., who died in England.

### SECURITIES WORTH \$2,000,000 HELD BY BRITISH PRIZE COURT

man Origin-Securities Not on Contraband List But Soon Likely to Be.

London, March 13 (5.50 p. m.)—Securities valued at 2,000,000 pounds suspected of being of German ownership, seized from mails in transit are now in possession of the prize court, according to an announcement today by the foreign office. Securities have not yet been declared absolute contraband, but it is possible that they will soon be placed on the contraband that under the orders-in-council these securities establish credit for hostile beligerents, and therefore can be lexily held up.

The authorities here declare that innocent ownership can be easily proved by reference to the banks which hold any of the detained securities, and that therefore nothing in the nature of a hardship, beyond a slight delay, is liable to be suffered by innocent owners.

Canadian and Australian Scale Almost Same, Premier Borden Says,

FAVORS PERMANENT PENSION BOARD

Will Recommend to Minister of Railways Special Rates for Men in Khaki Going to Visit Families.

Ottawa, March 13.—Mr. E. M. MacoDonald moved at the opening of the
House for a copy of the Canadian pension list. Mr. MacDonald went on to
point out that the present pension
scale made a distinction between injuries received by soldiers while in
training and those in the face of the
enemy. This, he thought, anomalous.
Mr. MacDonald also thought the Canadian pension was too low for privates
as compared with officers, differing in
this respect from the Australian scale.
He considered that single men should
be better treated as compared with
married men since the latter at least
had some one to look after them. Reverting to the distinction between
rank in the matter of pensions Mr.
MacDonald sald that in Canada a
colonel was given five and a half times
the pension of a private, whereas in
Australia he received only two and
three-quarters times that amount. Mr.
MacDonald advocated a permanent
pensions board and government assistance for soldiers' homes. He also
suggested that men who had enlisted
for overseas service should be given
a rate of one cent per mile on government railways when they wished to
visit their families as well as a rate of
to cents per meal in dining cars.
