The control of the U.S. A. Service of Control of Service of Control of Service of Control of Service of Servic What are the essentials and non-essentials of kitchen work? Progressive women are studying this question, and as a result of their investigations much drudgery and heavy kitchen work is being climinated.

The essentials of simplified work are first, a convenient kitchen and this means one equipped with necessary tools.

Next, the arrangement of the farmiture and utensils should be such that all unnecessary steps are saved. The range should have the place of honor as regards light, the work tables should be near it, and the kitchen cabinet, or cuphord must be situated within reach of the work table.

Cooking utensils may be of any material so long as they are light to haindle and are easily cleaned. Much comment might be made on the awkward shape and inconvenience of even the finest kitchen ware but this criticism would not help matters in the least. The place to complain of these man-made mistakea is the store where they have been purchased, or better still, to the manufacturers.

There is no reason why kitchen utensils, used every day and often many times a day should be kept out of sight. Much better is it to have a row of hooks around the underside of the kitchen-table or at the side of the store on which to hang them.

This arrangement saves time and though the sauce pans and kettles may have to be washed each time they are used, the chances are that they are polished more brightly and kept cleaner than if piled into potemphoards out of sight.

The table tops and shelves around the sink will not need hard scrubbing it covered with xine sheeting, and the expense of having it put on is small.

Pantry shelves covered with canneled cloth are far more sanitary than when covered with paper and soiled places may be wiped off without removing the whole cover.
