



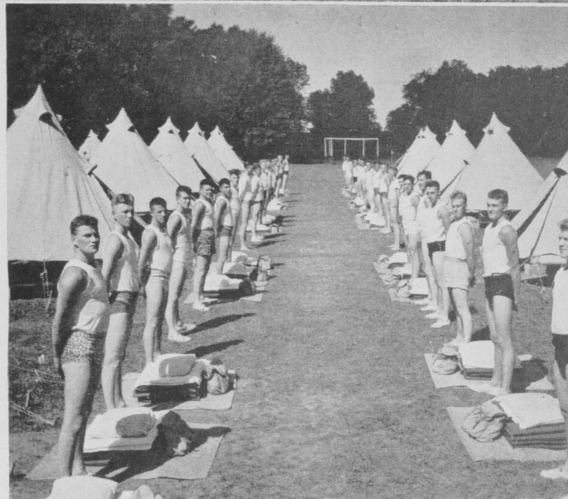
Under canvas at Long Island Training Camp last summer (above) were these husky young recruits at the right.
