week, in her 87th year.

ship for 75 years, passed away on  
Sunday morning in his 83rd year.

money. At Mount Brydges Fair she  
won first money.

Alt Judge's court held at Napier on  
part 3 of the voters' list for the  
township of Metcalfe, nine names  
were added to list. Court held by  
Judge Judd October 6th.

Charles McLean, a bachelor, aged  
76, who lived alone on his farm in  
Caradoc, was found dead in bed on  
Thursday. He was in Strathroy on  
business the Tuesday preceding.

Following an operation for appen-  
dicitis the death occurred in St. Jo-  
seph's Hospital, London, of Sadie  
Irene, daughter of George Little, of  
Albion, formerly of Campbellton.

William A. Gordon, for over fifty  
years a merchant at Florence, dis-  
posed of his daughter, the wife of  
Rev. Dr. W. T. Graham, in Toron-  
to, last week. He was in his 85th  
year.

The Appin Presbyterian W.M.S.  
and Young Women's Auxiliary are  
holding their thank-offering meeting  
in the Appin church next Sunday  
morning at 11 a.m. Mrs. Harris,  
of London, will give an address.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Hamilton have  
the sympathy of the community in  
the death of their infant son, born  
on Friday last. The little child died  
on Saturday morning and was buried  
the same day in Oakland cemetery.

Mac. M. McAlpine was presented  
with a diamond tie pin by the Great  
West Life Insurance Company for  
having written the most applications  
of any of their agents in the London  
district during the month of Sep-  
tember.

Five hundred thousand poppies are  
being made by disabled soldiers for  
Poppy Day, November 19. It is  
hoped that \$150,000 will be realized  
from their sale, which will be used  
for the relief of unemployed veter-  
ans this winter.

Fourteen Thamesville youths ap-  
peared before Magistrate Carscallen  
for swiping watermelons from the  
patch of Taylor Vance, west of that  
village. Five of the boys were as-  
sessed \$14.85 each, and five will have  
to separate themselves from a five-  
dollar bill each.

Councillor George F. Munroe is  
weigh master for the sugar beet crop  
which is being shipped from Glencoe  
this season. The product of about  
200 acres will be shipped from here.  
Beets show a better yield generally  
this year than last, but owing to re-  
cent rains are not so clean.

Three people narrowly escaped in-  
jury on Wednesday when two motor  
vehicles collided at a street corner  
in Chatham. A coupe, driven by  
Mrs. Knott, of Mishawaka, Indiana,  
who is visiting a sister at Appin,  
collided with a truck driven by Li-  
onel Purdy. Both machines were  
badly damaged.

The high school athletes were hon-  
ored at their field day exercises by  
the presence of one of the oldest  
members of the community in the  
person of Mrs. Jane Gilbert, who is  
in her 89th year. Mrs. Gilbert was  
an enthusiastic fan and took as live-  
ly an interest in the proceedings as  
one of youthful years.

A team of horses belonging to  
Hugh F. Munroe were struck and  
killed by C.P.R. No. 19 fast express  
train between sidetracks 16 and 20,  
EKFRID, on Monday evening. The  
horses had escaped through a rail-  
road gate belonging to the M.C.R.,  
which passes through Mr. Munroe's  
farm in Metcalfe township.

The newly-organized Glencoe brass  
band came in for a great deal of fa-  
vorable comment from spectators at  
the schools' field day exercises on  
Friday. For the short time they  
have been organized they have made  
wonderful progress. Their attrac-  
tive uniforms and general appear-  
ance were also freely commented upon.

A "fire prevention and better  
yard" contest is being conducted by  
the Southwestern Ontario Retail  
Lumber Dealers' Association, of  
which B. F. Clarke, Glencoe, is sec-  
retary. The judges are E. D. Hardy,

of Ottawa, who is widely known in  
insurance circles, and J. Grove  
Smith, Ottawa, Fire Commissioner  
of Canada. They will make a sur-  
vey of the yards within the next few  
weeks.

A public meeting held at the town  
hall on Sunday afternoon in the in-  
terests of the Ontario Temperance  
Act was addressed by A. E. Smith, a  
former member of the Manitoba Leg-  
islature. Mr. Smith emphasized a  
few of the reasons why the people  
of Ontario should support the con-  
tinuance of the Ontario Temperance  
Act in the coming plebiscite. Coun-  
cillor George F. Munroe presided at  
the meeting, which was largely at-  
tended.

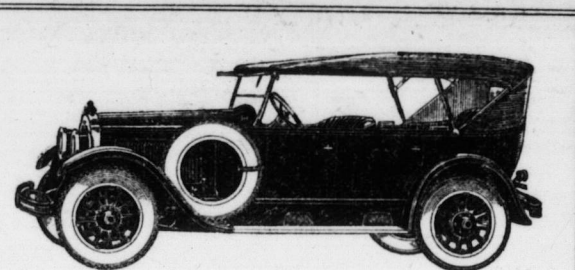
