### Local and Provincial.

The Baptist Convention of the Mar-  
time Provinces meets at Berwick to-  
morrow.

Rev. Wm. Brown, of Horton, occupied  
the pulpit of the Methodist church on  
Sunday morning last.

The annual meeting of the Kings  
County Sabbath-school Association is to  
be held at Berwick on September 15th.

The Presbyterian Sabbath-schools of  
Wolfville and Lower Horton expect to  
unite and hold their annual picnic at Oak  
Island, Annapolis, on Wednesday of next  
week.

In an item in our last issue, referring  
to the schooner J. F. Durant, we stated  
that she had a cargo of coal for the Wolf-  
ville Coal Co. It should have read for  
F. W. Woodman.

The result of Saturday's elections in  
the counties of Colchester and Lunenburg  
was strongly in favor of the liberal  
candidates, and Messrs. Morash and Mc-  
Clure were returned by handsome ma-  
jorities.

Fifty years ago the Baptists of the  
Maritime Provinces had 109 churches  
and 14,176 members. Now they have  
404 churches, 236 ordained ministers  
and 47,180 communicants. In 1895 they  
had about 690 Sunday Schools.

We have heard a good many complaints  
during the past week of bicyclists ap-  
propriating the use of the sidewalks, es-  
pecially in the outskirts of the town.  
There is a law prohibiting such use of  
the sidewalks, and the town authorities  
should see to it that pedestrians are not  
annoyed.

circumstance of fifty or sixty persons be-  
ing thrown out of employment, its clos-  
ing is much to be regretted.

Look-off, where they spent the day very  
pleasantly. On their return they were  
entertained at the American House until

thoroughly appreciate the gratifying and  
encouraging results so far obtained.
