BERESFORD MAY OPEN EXHIBITION

Fighting British Admiral May Come Here--John L. Sullivan Wants to be at Fair, Too.

Lord Charles Beresford, the distinguished admiral of the British navy, may open the Fredericton 1909 Exhibition on September 14th.

The question of who will open the first exhibition in New Brunswick running as long as ten days has not been decided by any means, but it is known that members of the Board of Directors of the big fair are favorable to asking Lord Beresford to press the button that will set the machinery in motion on the afternoon of Tuesday, September 14th.

Admiral Beresford arrived in Canada this week and on Monday will open the Toronto Exhibition. If he is invited to come to this city and can be induced to accept an invitation, his presence will add eclat to the opening ceremonies, which promise to be dazzling with brilliancy.

Another somewhat noted personage—although he gained his fame by another brand of fighting—who may be at the Fredericton 1909 Exhibition, is John L. Sullivan, the ex-champion heavyweight fighter of the world.

John L. has written to Secretary Hooper regarding appearing at the fair with the other old timer, Jake Kilrain, in sparring exhibitions, and also giving his monologue vaudeville stunt in Amusement Hall. John L. and Kilrain during the past year or so have appeared in some of the best vaudeville houses throughout the middle and western States, and their act has made a great hit.

Some years ago, when he resided in Boston, Secretary Hooper knew John L. Sullivan, who was then a younger man. The ex-champion, however, remembered his acquaintance with the hustling manager of the Fredericton 1909 Exhibition, and their correspondence over John L.'s appearance here has been of a particularly interesting nature.

RECORD CLASSES AT NORMAL SCHOOL

Already 300 Students Are Sure and Increased Accommodations is More Serious Problem Than Ever.

Principal Bridges of the Provincial Normal School this morning made the announcement that there would be a record number of students at the Normal School at the commencement of the next academic year at the institution opening on Wednesday, Sept. 1. Already the applications of 299 young men and women have been received and accepted and the number is likely to be swelled during the first few days of the term. The record number of students at the institution at the opening of the year is 276 and which figures were established three years ago.

The large number of students makes the question of accommodations at the Normal School a more serious problem than ever. The increasing of accommodations at the Normal School is a question which has been in the minds of educationists of the province for some years past and it now becomes more serious than ever. The new classes at the Normal School will be made up as follows:
