

June, 1854 to June, 1856, when defeated on the Prohibitory Liquor Law question and the Govt. resigned ; from June, 1857 to March, 1865, when defeated on the Union policy of his Govt., and again from 1866 until the Union, when he resigned to accept a seat in the Commons, and represent New Brunswick in the Dominion Cabinet. The Prohibitory Liquor Law of N.B. was the work of Mr. T. as a private mem.; amongst other measures of importance introduced and carried by the Govt. of which he was a mem., may be mentioned the following : Vote by ballot, and extension of the franchise ; an Act authorizing the construction of the European and North American Railway as a govt. work ; an Act authorizing the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, N.B., agreeing to pay three-and-a-half twelfths of the cost ; an Act granting facility for the construction of certain Railways under which 175 miles are now being built in N.B. Returned to Commons at g.e., 1867 ; re-elected at last g.e. A Liberal.—*Daily Star, Ottawa ; St. John, N.B.*

TOBIN, STEPHEN. [*Halifax.*]

Family, originally from Irel., came to Halifax from Massachusetts, 1759. S. of Thos. S. Tobin, Esq., of Halifax ; and grands. of the late Hon.
