CHARACTERISTICS OF THE LEADERS WHO ARE SENT BY PROVIDENCE TO REPRESENT CHRISTIANITY TO THEIR OWN TIMES.

Now when such men appear upon the seene as representatives of the Christianity of Christ to the people of their own age, they are distinguished by at least three characteristics or signs; first, they always stand for the weak or unprivileged or defenceless classes of the people. Bernard of Clairvaux championed the eause of the oppressed poor against the robber barons. John Bunyan and John Wesley went with the gospel of spiritual reg to the neglected and degraded classes of Eng and; and Henry Ward Beecher, in his early days, gave up his reputation and every earthly interest in advoeating the eause of the negro slave. Secondly, such men rediscover, and are the means of resurrecting, and of bringing clearly and prominently before people in general, some great truth of divine revelation that had hitherto been latent in Christianity, but had been praetically buried out of the common people's view, by the ceremonialism and the traditions or the secular spirit of a lapsed and unspiritual Church; as
