

Robertson, Wm. Oliver, P. Solomon, New York; and H. Rogers, Boston. The Pennsylvania and St. Andrew were on their way out; the day of sailing of the former was the 25th December, and of the latter the 1st January.

The Steamer Great Western was to leave Bristol on the 28th ultimo, and the Liverpool on the 6th February.

Halifax papers of the 7th inst. were received by mail yesterday. H. M. S. Inconstant arrived at Halifax on the 7th instant, in 21 days from Cork, having on board 310 officers and men of the 37th and 69th Regiments.

Two companies of the 69th Regiment arrived at Halifax on the 3rd inst. in H. M. S. Crocodile from Barbadoes. The remainder of the Regiment was to leave in a few days aft., in the transports Eliza and Numa.

The House of Assembly of Nova-Scotia has unanimously voted the sum of one thousand pounds, for the relief of the widows and families of those who have fallen in defence of the Canada.

On Thursday, the 14th instant, the Special Council met at the Government House Montreal, when the following members (with the exceptions marked by an asterisk) appeared, and having taken the oath, took their seats:—Messieurs Cuthbert, Pothier, De Lery, Moffatt, McGill, Lathierier, Joliette, De Rocheblave, Neisson, Amable Dionne, Gerard, Quessel, Christie, Casgrain, Walker, Faribault, Molson, Mayrand, Knoultun, Penn, Joseph Dionne, Austin, Mondelot.

His Excellency the Governor General having laid before the Council two Ordinances, and having designated the Hon. James Cuthbert, as Presiding Member in his absence, retired.

On Friday, the 15th inst. two Ordinances received the sanction of the Governor General. The first, suspends for a limited time, the Act 34 George III., establishing two sessions of the Court of King's Bench in Montreal for the Criminal offences, and the Act 10 and 11 Geo. IV., extending the periods of holding such terms, so far as relates to the term commencing in the present month of February, which is not to be held. This is to prevent interference with the Court Martial now sitting in that city.

The second is entitled, an Ordinance to authorize the Assistant Judge, appointed in lieu of the Resident Judge of the District of Three Rivers, to sit and act in the Court of King's Bench for the District of St. Francis, in this Province, and to explain a certain Act therein mentioned, and for other purposes.

His Excellency the Governor General has received from Lieutenant General Sir Colin Campbell, the sums of £1000, voted by the two Houses of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, and £492 13 s., the contribution of the inhabitants of Halifax, in aid of the loyal sufferers and their families, in Upper and Lower Canada.

Dr. Geo. Holmes, accused of the murder of Mr. Tasche, of Kamouraska, has been arrested at Burlington, Vermont, and has undergone an examination on the charge before the magistrates. It is supposed that there will be no hesitation on the part of the United States authorities to deliver him over for trial in this Province.

The storm of Saturday night and Sunday morning broke up the ice which has held for some time between the Point Levy shore and this city, and the chance of an ice bridge, this winter, has disappeared with it. The roads are still good and the travelling excellent.

A gentleman who arrived yesterday from Fredericton, reports that Sir John Harvey upon hearing that an armed force from the State of Maine had entered upon the disputed territory and taken up their position on the Anse-au-River, sent Capt. Hawkshaw of the Engineers, to inquire into the circumstance, and should he find that necessity required it, directed him to procure accommodation for troops, which would immediately be dispatched here.—The Maine party made prisoners of six Engineers when they found cutting timber, and the British residents took five Officers prisoners, with a two horse sledge and two kegs of powder. The officers have been sent prisoner to Fredericton. It is added, that the men finding themselves

without their officers, retreated abandoning their heavy baggage. Extract of a letter from Woodstock, N. B., dated 13th February:— On the night of the 11th inst. the inhabitants of Woodstock provided themselves with arms to the extent of 110 stand, and proceeded to Ristook to repel the Americans who had invaded the Province.—The lumberers in that quarter are determined to fight upon their "own hook" until Sir John Harvey sends up a competent force of regulars which, I have no doubt, he will do immediately.

We shall in all probability have fighting in our neighbourhood very soon—and it is a comfortable reflection to us that every man in the Province is imbued with the finest spirit, and prepared to treat our lawless and arrogant republican neighbors as they deserve.—Mercury.

PROPERTY.—The following is from the Prescott Sentinel:— "A work was published some years since in the United States by an old man of the name of Millar, who foretold events that would happen with relation to England and the United States for years to come, many of which have already proved true.—The old man stated that in 1838 there would be laid fighting, but the British would gain the day and that many lives would be lost, and that in 1845 a decisive engagement would take place in the interior of the United States, at their Capitol, and that then, the Americans would be signally defeated, a general breach take place between the North and South, and the Union Jack take the precedence of the Stars and Stripes. Up to this time the predictions of the old man have proved true,—who can say that his whole prophecies will not be verified? It looks much like it at the present moment.
