He accordingly prefented the faid Bill, to the Houle, and the same was received and read, for the first time.

RESOLVED, that the faid Bill be read a fecond time on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. M'Cord, feconded by Mr. Badeaux ;

ORDERED, that Mr. M<sup>c</sup>Cord have leave to bring in a Bill to continue the Acts therein mentioned, refpecting Aliens, and certain fubjects of H1s Majefty, who have refided in France, coming into this Province, or refiding therein.

He accordingly prefented the faid Bill to the House, and the same was received, and read for the first time.

Mr. M'Cord moved, feconded by Mr. Badeaux, that the faid Bill be read a fecond time on Tuesday next.

Mr. Bourdages moved in amendment, feconded by Mr. Durocher, to leave out "Tuefday," and infert "the twentieth of March."

The House divided on the question of amendment, and the names being called for, they were taken down as follows:
