A Berlin despatch says: The official reports demanded by Dr. von Gossler, Minister of Education, from all Prussian university clinics and pathological institutes, on the efficacy of Prof. Koch's tuberouline, have just been published by Professor Guttsladt. They are fifty five in number, including the report of the Municipal Hospital in Moabit, one of the departments of which is under Dr. Koch himself. The reports extend only to the end of 1890. They comprise about eight weeks, and contain no final results, but their contents are nevertheless of great importance. During the time in question about 17,500 injections were made on 2,172 patients. The greatest number of injections received. about 17,500 injections were made on 2,172 patients. The greatest number of injections received by one person was 54. The largest dose was 3.826 grammes. Most of the reports contain exact histories of the cases. Opinions differ considerably as to the value of the fluid as a diagnostic and in discovering tuberculosis of internal organs. Of 1,661 patients suffering from internal tuberculosis, 13 were cured, 171 considerably improved, 194 improved, 586 not improved, and 46 died.
