STIFF FIGHTING NEAR CHA ULNES.

London, Aug. 12-The British are finding their hardest fighting in the distrct close around Chaulnes, where the Germans are making a despearte effort to keep the Allies back in order to retain the use of the important lakes and higheways out of Chaulnes Allied artillery and air craft are doing their utmost to make the use of these communications unpleasant for the Germans.

SUCCESSFUL AIR WORK.

London, Aug. 12. Fifty tons of bombs were dropped by our airmen on August 11, and the following night.

The two chief objectives both by day and night were the crossings and certain railway junctions of military importance.

Many direct hitz were observed. At night the stations at Peronne and Cambrai were severely attacked with good effect. All our night bombing machines returned safely. Enemy aircraft, flying in large formations, were active on battle front. Twenty nine hostile machines were destroye in air fighting during the day and twenty four others were driven down out of control. Four hostile battalions were shot down in flames . Five of our machines are missing.

The observation work for our artillery carried out by airplanes was continued and today a machine was brought down by our anti-air craft in addition to those already reported.
