LAURIER GOVERNMENT ENDORSED AT POLLS

Up to Present the Government Received Majorities in Every Province Except Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia—Sifton Downed—All Liberals From Saskatchewan Except R. S. Lake.

Judging from the returns that are completed it would appear that Sir Wilfrid Laurier would have a substantial majority in the new parliament. There are several elections to be held later but the most of these will go with the government. The Conservatives made gains in Quebec, Nova Scotia, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia. In New Brunswick and Ontario the Liberals did far better than they expected and it was these two provinces that Borden depended upon to a great extent for his victory. The other provinces went about as expected.

The result in Ontario was the surprise of the campaign. Even the Globe, prior to the election, conceded a majority of about thirty for Borden. Instead there will be only about a dozen of a majority for the Conservatives. In New Brunswick, both Pugsley and Emmerson were elected and they have a big following from that province there being only two Conservatives elected out of thirteen members. The province of Prince Edward Island furnishes the most unique situation of the whole. In the last house there were 3 Conservatives and 1 Liberal. The three seats held by the Conservatives returned Liberals on Monday, and the seat held by the Liberal returned a Conservative. In Manitoba the Liberals received a severe blow, only securing the election of two candidates, Sifton in Brandon and Molloy in Provencher. Sifton's majority in Brandon is only sixteen and there are 47 protested ballots which when adjudicated upon will probably give the seat to Mr. Daly. The result in Winnipeg was a great surprise to the Liberals and a source of gratification to the Conservatives. A. Haggart, K.C., the Conservative candidate, has a majority close to 2,000 over D. C. Cameron, the Sifton nominee.

Siftonism in Manitoba has received a big slap and Clifford Sifton will no more be a factor in the public life of Canada. Tad Burrows in Dauphin, of timber limit fame, was also defeated. The result in Saskatchewan is exciting for the Liberals as so far R. S. Lake in Qu'Appelle is the only Conservative elected. The election in Prince Albert has not taken place yet and while Jas. McKay the Conservative should win, no doubt the result so far in Canada will have an effect on the vote of that constituency.

Alberta broke about even. The three northern constituencies went Liberal, the three southern went Conservative and the one in the centre is still in doubt. Of the elections reported so far from British Columbia only one Liberal has been elected. In Victoria, Templeman, Minister of Inland Revenue, was defeated. He is the only minister to sustain defeat at the polls. It is probable that Ralph Smith who was elected in Nanaimo, will be the next Cabinet minister from British Columbia.

Conservatives Sweep B.C.

Vancouver, Oct. 26.—The Conservatives carried today three out of four constituencies in which the elections were held, Vancouver, Victoria, and New Westminster. The most signal victory was that of Cowan in this city, who defeated W. W. B. McInnes, Liberal, Hon. J. Martin, Independent and Kingsley, Socialist, by a majority of fourteen hundred in a total vote of ten thousand. This is a Conservative gain and the first Conservative victory in the riding's history. Cowan's vote was 1,444; McInnes 3,041; Martin 2,042; Kingsley 1,435. The second feature of today's contest was the defeat of Hon. Wm. Templeman in Victoria, where the minister of inland revenue and minister of mines went down to defeat before G. H. Barnard by a majority of five.

How Ontario Went

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—Up to 11.30 the Ontario returns indicated 27 Conservatives and 36 Liberals elected with five ridings to hear from. The result is a great disappointment to the Conservatives who had confidently counted upon taking 69 seats. There is only one explanation of the situation, namely: That the unlimited use of money and the powerful influence of the G.T.R., together have conspired to reduce the Liberal Conservative majority in the premier province. No other reason than the influence of the G.T.R. can explain the election of George Graham in Brockville and the defeat of A. L. McLaren, one of the most popular men in parliament, in North Perth. One satisfaction that the Conservatives had is that the notorious attempt of the Grists to steal Nipissing and the two Algomas has been frustrated. Among the new men coming into parliament from Ontario is Capt. Wallace, a young man of brilliant attainments, and a son of the late Hon. N. Clark Wallace, who would have been elected two years ago, but for the indifference of the voters.

Fight in Brandon

Brandon, Oct. 26.—"I feel that I have actually won this election," said Hon. T. M. Daly, to a Telegram representative tonight. "But for the corrupt methods that were employed against me, I should certainly have received a substantial majority. I thank the electors of Brandon most

heartily for the splendid support they have rendered me. My Conservative friends and my committees spared no effort to place me at the head of the poll and to all of them I am truly grateful. Sixteen of a majority and all polls in the province were won by the Conservatives, except in Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia. One of his workers is spending a term in jail for openly buying votes on the street, and returning officer Ingram is out on \$2,999 bail for striking the name of McCullough off the list at poll 3 and substituting the name of Nichols. Never before has the city of Brandon experienced such an election. Not until near midnight was the result certain, as word could not be got from back districts. Both crowds were ready to celebrate at any time and anxiously awaited for some one to make a move. It would be hard to say which side is the most jubilant, as the Conservative party feel sure that Hon. Mr. Sifton bought his seat. To bring a majority of 821 down to 48 is what T. M. Daly did against the heaviest odds and man had to contend with in Manitoba or probably in Canada. All day long the battle raged and the Liberals became so much afraid that they would lose that men were sent out on the street with the money to bring results. One of the men, Fred Darier, was caught red-handed and run in by Provincial Police Constable Armstrong. J. H. Ingram, returning officer, sent out a warrant against Armstrong for carrying firearms and Armstrong was locked up in the customs house. Not satisfied with that a warrant was sworn out against Provincial Constable Brownlee, who is well known all over the province, and Brownlee kept company with Armstrong in the customs house. The warrant against Brownlee stated that he interfered with a Dominion officer while he was performing his duty. In the afternoon the scrutineers in the polling stands laid information against Ingram for changing the name McCullough on the list to Nichols, and Ingram was arrested by Provincial Constable Smith, but he was later released on \$2,000 bail. Both Armstrong and Brownlee were allowed out on bail.

Protest Brandon

Winnipeg, Oct. 27.—Revised returns show that Selkirk has gone Conservative, Bradbury leading by over 100 with only nine small polls to come in which will not effect the result. There will also certainly be a recount in Brandon, where Sifton has 16 final majority, while there are 47 protested ballots which Conservative claim will give Daly the seat when adjudicated upon. On the other hand Liberals claim that they have a good chance of electing Burrows in Dauphin when outlying polls come in. The present summary in Manitoba is eight Conservatives and two Liberals with a recount in Brandon.
