J. D. Evans of Islington, in a letter to the Canadian Bee Journal, answers a complaint made by Spectator in a recent issue of The Sun-a complaint in which was stated that bees had proved destructive to ripe raspberries in Spectator's garden. Mr. Evans in his reply states that he keeps bees and is surrounded by raspberry growers, some of whom have patches within ten yards of his hives. Still, he has never heard a single complaint of bees at tacking perfect berries. It has been explained, he says, that, from the con struction of the mouth of the bee, it cannot bite perfect fruit any more than a man can bite a piece out of an uncut pumpkin. Bees can, however, bite small raspberries as the fruit number 100,000. Of them it is said composed of small globes. But the oss from bees in this way is, says Mr. Evans, so trifling that it is not worth while considering, while the benefit the fruit-grower derives from having the fruit fertilized by bees more than balances the amount a hundred times


