#### Canadian Royal Princes.

Mr. Henniker Heaton's proposal that

we should have royal Princes of Canada and Australia recalls the fact that there was once a Viscount of Canada and still may be somewhere on the earth's surface, for any precise information we possess to the contrary. The titles Viscount of Canada and Earl o titles Viscount of Canada and Earl of Stirling were borne during the 17th century by the Alexander family whose representatives, though at pres-ent fallen from their ancient grandeur are said not to be extinct. The orig-inal William Alexander for whom the honors were created was a Scottish poet, born about 1567. Even the names of his heavy and profile enics are hard

of his heavy and prolix epics are hard to come by to-day, but by 1063 they had won him Knighthood, and by 1613 an attachment to the household of Prince Charles. In 1614 began to appear his huge man "Decomada". pear his huge poem, "Doomsday," which 1637 had not seen the end of Honors and emoluments in the mean-time accumulated on his head. He was made Secretary of State for Scotland. made Secretary of State for Scotians, Keeper of the Signet, a Commissioner of the Exchequer, and a Judge of the Court of Session. In 1621 he received a grant of "Nova Scotia"—a vague term, which included what is now New

term, which included what is now New Brunswick and a fair portion of the New England States—a boon, however, which the French successes in America soon made valueless. It was in 1630 that he was made "Viscount of Can-ada." In spite of his rare good for-tune he appears to have died insolvent about the year 1640.

"Co- Boss." Mr. George Hempl, President of the American Dialect Society, writes to the editor of The New York Nation on a theme that is of interest to a great

farming country like ours:—

"The call of 'Co' boss' is familiar to most of the inhabitants of our northern States and Canada. In fact, it has something poetic about it for many of us, reminding us of fields and lanes and woods and the mysterious suggestiveness of the coming on of night. And so it is not strange that the word boss has for most Americans an interest which other farm words lack, and that people often enquire as to its origin. Its practical identity in form and meaning with Latin bos, together with the improbability of farm hands dropping into Latin diction in halling cattie, has wrapped the etymology of the word in a tantalizing mystery. I have long tried to dispet this cloud and get at the plain facts of the origin of the word, and, now that I have succeeded, it seems to me that the general interest in the expression warrants me in publishing its history in a non-technical "Bartlett was probably the first to call farming country like ours :-

ceeded. it seems to me that the general interest in the expression warrants me in publishing its bistory in a non-technical journal.

"Bartlett was, probably, the first to call attention to the word, which he presents in the diminutive form bossy, with reference to the Greek word for 'caif.' It then entered the larger dictionaries, and is referred to Latin bos in Webster, the Century and the so-called Standard. The first gleam of the truth is to be found in the Century, where the Icelandic call bas is referred to: 'cf. Icel. bas, bas, an exclamation used in driving cows into their stalis (bass, a stall, boose; see boose).'

"in America the word is rarely heard except in the call, where it has acquired almost the character of a name, and is often written with a capital, and sometimes confounded with Bess. The form of the call does not vary much, being come boss or bossy or co' boss in the morth, and sook boss or soo' boss in the midland. In England the word seems to be rare in calls; the only certain information that I have received comes from Somensetshire, where Mr. G. Sweetman of Wincanton reports Coop Bossey (that is, Come up, bossy, as a call to calves. Perhaps the call, Boosh, booshie, that Miss K. Irvine of Lerwick reports from the Sheiland Islands, as used in calling cows and calves, is the same, for the Old Norse call kus kus appears in northern England with sh: cush, cusha, cushy, etc. But the word is in frequent use in southern, or Saxon, England, as a common noun. It occurs in the forms bos or boss, bus or buss, bossy, bossy-calf, boss-calf, boss-calf, buss-calf and busk, with the meanings, 'young calf,' unweaned ealf,' 'calf too long unweaned,' 'spolit child,' milk-sop.'

"The use of boss or buss for boss calf or buss calf is parallel to the use of Jersey for Jersey cow, pug for pug dog, Shanghai for Shanghai chieken, canary for canary bird, etc. That what was originally a word for calf has come to designate a cow is to be observed in many similar cases. Coal Supplies of the World. As each year the coal consumption of he world grows, so do coal resources, hitherto unexplored, appear to meet the demand. Last year in Great Britain we 'brought to bank' 220,000,000 tons. Fifdemand. Last year in Great Britain we "brought to bank" 220,000,000 tons. Fifteen years ago it would have been declared impossible for the world 'to absorb such a quantity in addition to what was being produced by other countries. Yet not only is our own supply of coal and our exportation of coal increasing, but the exploration of new coal seams is going on all over the world. and the commanding position which Europe once occupied as the colliery of the world is each year diminishing in importance. Great Britain's position as the chief "pit" is still maintained, though the United States is running us hard, but the question for us is not how long our coal resources will last, but how long we are to go as chief coal supplier to the world. The coal resources of Europe have been appraised as follows:—

This estimate may for the time relieve us of any fear of the immediate exhaustion of our coal supplies; but it does not reassure us with respect to our position as colliery owners, and it must be recollected that this by no means represents the coal supplies of the world. It does not include the unknown but enormous resources of the Russian Empire, the laggest and most valuable of which will probably be opened up by the Trans-Siberian Railway, nor the deposits of India, China, Japan and Australasia, nor, again, those of America which can be supplied both to Europe and to the far east.

But there is another side of the question. Other nations are not so dependent upon us for coal as many people seem to think. The following table of the world's annual production reveals not only the possibilities of the future but one or two rather startling actualities of the present. They are the figures of the yearly coal crop of the world:—

#### FUTURE OF BEEF.

It is Predicted That in Five Years the Quality of Cattle Will Greatly Improve.

I predict that in five years the quality of cattle will have so improved as to be beyond the expectations of the most sanguine. In fact, the wonderful reformation is already shown in the young stock on the ranges, and is a revelation to those who have handled that class of cattle. By their fruits ye shall know them, and one has only to watch the shipment of cattle from the great breeding grounds of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona for the next three years to get an idea as to what the Shorthorn has done for the breed and for humanity. Some one has said that the literature of a people was an index to its character. The literature and press of a country may mould the character of its people, but he who provides the beef supplies the brain and culture of the author or editor. Erratic France opens or closes her door, according to the crop yield of that country, and the agrarian party in Germany holds the key to her door, refusing to open on the flimsy pretext of disease. Countries of lesser importance follow the lead of the two larger. The flimsy pretext of disease is so unwarranted as to merit the condemnation of the whole American people.

The Corn Worm. The corn worm is known in the South as the boll-worm, as it injures the cotton-boll. The adult insect is about one-third larger than our illustration. It is a heavily bodied moth, with yellowish-gray or clayey-yellow fore-wings, tinged with light olive green, marked with lines of darker green and dark brown or black. The hind wings are of a paler shade, with a broad, blackish outer band inclesing a pale spot toward the apical portion. The adult insect deposits its eggs in the tip of the ear among the silk. After hatching the larvae feed until about one-third grown, when they begin to

tunnel through the kernels under the husks toward the butt of the ear. The full-grown worm is about one and one-

The Corn-Worm. a, b, eggs; c, larva; d, pupa in cocoon; e, f, moth. quarter inches long, rather robust, tapering toward the head. In color the worms vary from pale green to dark brown. There are several black, shining, elevated tubercles on each segment, each bearing a short, brown hair. The full-grown larvae make a round hole in the earth, the inside walls of which they cement over. At the bottom of these chambers the larvae change to pupae, in which form they pass the winter. Fall plowing is recommended to break up these chambers and expose and destroy the insects.

it, begin this year to grow it. If you have no bed, start one. you have an old bed, plan to replant it.

There are other new varieties that of-fer all the desirable features of fine shape, high color, julcy flavor and pro-lificness.

Don't let your chickens assist you in cultivating your strawberry beds. When the strawberry plant begins to grow in the spring, there is a compact little green ball in the centre of the plant, which is the mature plant in embryo. That little ball is pleasant eating to the hen, and she will find it and pluck it from each and every plant. So, if you have let your hens range in your strawberry beds, you must not expect a good crop of fruit.— J. G. Leland.
