VANCOUVER RIOTS.

Japanese Journal Makes Comparison With San Francisco.

Tokio, Sept. 14.—In The Hochi last evening Count Okuma contrasts the anti-Japanese disturbanese at San Francisco with the Vancouver rick, briefly, as follows:

"The latter occurrence must not be placed in the same category, as the former. The San Francisco authorities directly or indirectly countenanced the acts of the rioters, while the Municipal Government was a centre of corruptior; almost a state of anarchy prevailing. I liken the San Francisco riot to the Boxer outhreak. President Roosevelt's attitude at first was very fair and admirable; but, after his conference with a delegation from San Francisco, a change came which sadly disappointed us.

"The Vancouver incident was quite different. It was an outrageous act, limited to laborers, and supporters. The local authorities sincerely did their utmost to suppress the riot and protect our countrymen. They even went so far as to give permission to our compatriots to take measures of self-defence. The sincerity so fully evidenced of these really worthy local authorities of our ally in their effort to protect our rights make us confident of effecting a satisfactory solution of the deplorable situation.

Will See Sir Wilfrid.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—Consul-General Nosse of Japan stated last night that Ishii, the commissioner whom Japan has sent to Canada and the United States to enquire into immigration conditions, will reach here on Monday afternoon and will discuss the Vancouver incident with Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

To Avoid Trouble.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 14.—The steamer Woolwich, now due, with Japanese from Yokohama, is expected to dischatge its human cargo at North Vancouver in order to avoid the possibility of a riot.


