### FREAKS OF PARTISANSHIP.

There is a good deal to be said for the Government on the constitutional side of the Dundonald case. But that was not enough for the thorogoing partisan. As soon as it was discovered that Lord Dundonald and the Government had disagreed beyond hope of reconciliation, party allegiance demanded that Lord Dundonald should be discredited. He was represented as proposing the erection of fortresses along the Canadian frontier, and as being restrained only by the good sense of his political chief. Then it was contended that his services in the South African war had been grossly exaggerated, and were hardly worth mentioning.

Finally, his ancestors are lugged into the dispute. It appears that the famous seaman who bore the name early in the century was not amenable to discipline, and that the present Lord Dundonald has inherited these rebellious instincts. There is something very strange and even ludicrous, in the champion of a Liberal Government going back a cen tury and taking sides with the Tory reactionaries who persecuted and oppressed the reformer of abuses, the Radical member of Parliament. strange bedfellows are made by politics as well as by poverty.

A party whose leaders are in office soon develops an attitude of reverence toward officeholders. In a farewell demonstration to Lord Dundonald, the Ottawa Free Press detects treason and rebellion against the powers that be, and talks of its promoters as ringleaders, while the general is a "disgraced official." Flunkeyism in this country is not likely to take the form of worship of a titled mobility, the object of worship being seldom with us. But it is quite likely to take the form of servility to ward a wealthy class or a political chief, and of this there are already indications .- Toronto World.

## AN AMERICAN VIEW.

Those who dream of a coming era of universal peace, when nations shall settle all their differences by friendly imterchanges or by arbitration, will not receive much encouragement from the history of the Malacca affair. which now appears to be happily end ed without blows. That war did not result between Russia and England, with the awful complications that twould follow, is not the feature in it most calculated to attract the atention of the thoughtful. What must be most terrifying to all friends of human peace is that so trifling an afflair, a matter of a few dollars at worst, could have been used by a civilized and Christian nation as a pretext for war, which might have cost hundreds of thousands of human lives. And yet, for a whole week, the British press seemed intent on lashing public opinion into a frenzy, and to be determined to push the government to exteremes regardless of the frightful consequences that were probable. Happily for the world, sane and sober men were in charge of the affairs of both nations, and Lord Lansdowne and Count Lamsdorff arranged the matter satisfactorily without losing pipers, as some of the papers would have us believe they did.

What the world has real reason to be alarmed about is the illustration the incident affords of the facility with which irresponsible newspapers can bring great nations to the very brink of war over a matter that is mot worth to either of them the cos of a single life. The Fashoda affair was something of the same nature. There was no great interest involved on either side, and the respective for eign offices of France and England were perfectly competent to settle the affair amicably and pleasantly, but their task was made almost impossi ble by the clamor of the paper both im Paris and London. In the present case, the cry for blood was all British, the Russian press being very quiet under the hand of the censor, but had the same incident occurred at a time when Russia's army was no fully occupied, war would certainly have followed .- Detroit News.
