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JAPS' ATTACK ON TUMEN

Osaka Reports Big Engagement is Now in Progress.

Japanese to Threaten Harbin By An Expedition Up the Amur River—Landing Chronicled at Dekastries Freshshadows Well-Planned Attempt to Send Naval Assistance for Attack on Fortifications.

London, July 27.—The correspondent of The Daily Telegraph at Tokio, sends a report received from Osaka, Japan, to the effect that a Japanese army of many thousands is attacking the Russian position on the Tumen river.

Siberian Lighthouse Seized. St. Petersburg, July 27.—Despatches from Manchuria report the landing of a Japanese battalion and the seizure of a lighthouse on the Siberian coast near Dekastries, a post formerly called Alexandrovsk, 700 miles north of Vladivostok, after a preliminary shelling by torpedo boat destroyers.

Military officials here say this apparently is part of the strategy of the Japanese to prevent the escape of Russian garrisons in Sakhalin through the straits. They add that the landing is too far north to have any bearing on the main campaign or on operations against Vladivostok.

To Seize Mouth of Amur. London, July 27.—The Japanese landing at Dekastries, which is the terminus of the only cable line connecting the mainland with the Island of Sakhalin, is regarded by the London morning newspapers as an attempt to seize the mouth of the Amur River, in order to enable the Japanese to despatch an army up that great waterway to threaten the Russian communications.

Japanese gunboats and torpedo boats could thus reach Harbin and give effectual assistance to any attack on the Russian fortifications.

Not in Spirit of Defiance. Washington, July 27.—Whether there is to be peace in the Far East or a continuance of the war will be practically decided at the first business meeting of the Washington conference, which will convene at the navy yard, Portsmouth, N. H., about August 5.

Baron Komura will open the occasion by threatening to withdraw the essentials of Japan's terms for further negotiations. This, it is declared, will not be done in a spirit of defiance. If the Russian plenipotentiaries are prepared to accept these essentials, the officials here are confident that the hands will be laid for negotiations sure to lead to the signing of a treaty of Washington bringing peace in the Far East.

Witte Is Detained. Cherbourg, July 27.—M. Witte has not left Cherbourg owing to the non-arrival of the Kaiser. Witte's departure, which is foreboded at Southampton. He expects to sail early this morning.

Rejestyevsky Operated On. Tokio, July 27.—Vice-Ambassador Rejestyevsky has undergone a successful operation. He was wounded on his forehead in a fight with a small piece of bone removed. His condition is considered satisfactory.

Wants Prompt Compensation. St. Petersburg, July 27.—Acting on U. S. Ambassador Meyer's recommendation in order to obviate months of delay, the Standard Oil Co. consignors of the cargo of the British steamer Oldham, which was seized by Russian warships and burned off Sakhalin Island, have placed their case in the hands of a local attorney, who is empowered to ask the prize court to act as adjudicator. The cargo was valued at \$123,000. The British Ambassador is making representations in behalf of the British owners of the ship.

An Inflammatory Proclamation. Odessa, July 27.—The Governor of Odessa has issued an extraordinary proclamation which, when posted in the city to-day, may have the effect of increasing the already bitter feeling against the Jews among the troops and more ignorant classes of the population. The proclamation continues:

"Letters have come from the Jews charging the police with preparing for a Jewish massacre."

The Governor then declares that such action is impossible and will not be permitted, but he adds: "The Governor is astonished at the Jews addressing such a letter to him, seeing that it is the Jews themselves who caused the disorders. The police invariably found

revolvers, bombs, and prohibited literature in Jewish houses. But for the Jews there would be no disturbances and no Kniak Potemkin affair. Now the Jews have the impudence to bring charges against the police."

The Boilermakers. Toronto, July 27.—Boiler inspection laws and the quality of steel plates for boilers were the chief topics discussed yesterday at the American Boilermakers' Association convention here yesterday. Then the officers were elected. R. Munroe, Jr., of Pittsburg, Pa., president, and among the vice-presidents and second is J. J. Main, Toronto. The association will meet at Pittsburg next year.

Warrant For Abduction. St. Thomas, July 27.—Mrs. Mary Ann Mowers of Port Bruce was in the city yesterday and laid an information before County Magistrate Hunt, charging Walter Weir with the abduction of her 14-year-old daughter, Florence Mowers. A warrant was therefore issued for the arrest of Weir, who is believed to be in the States.

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Women Get Votes. Melbourne, Victoria, July 27.—The Victorian Assembly yesterday passed a bill granting the elective franchise to women.

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Spanish and French Clash. New York, July 25.—The Spanish residents made a demonstration Sunday against France in protest, cables a Herald correspondent at Tangier, Morocco, against the sanitary measures ordered by French medical officers in inspection of the ships and port. A serious dispute between the French and Spanish legations is expected over the affair.
