BULGARIA AGREES TO DEMOBOLIZE ARMY AND GIVE ALLIES A FREE PASSAGE FOR MILITARY OPERATIONS THROUGH BULGARIA

Austrian Slavs Will Rise; Despotic Hapsburgs Doom is Sealed.

AUSTRIAN SLAVS WILL RISE

PARIS, Sept. 30—The capitulation of Bulgaria, says the Journal Des Debats, is the beginning of the end for the Central Powers. Germany, it adds, will have the greatest difficulty in concentrating forces upon the Belgrade-Nish line in an attempt to save her communications with the Orient, and the Central Powers are incapable of occupying Bulgaria or setting up there a government to resist the Allies. Ferdinand is doomed, it continues, as his subjects will never pardon this disaster. Formerly the Central Powers threatened to dominate the Balkans and the Eastern Mediterranean, but the present Bulgaran debacle finds the Central Powers menaced on all the Balkan fronts. The feeble Austrian garrisons remaining in Serbia after Bulgaria's withdrawal will be annihilated. With the capitulation of the Bulgarians the Austrian Slavs will rise against their despotic rulers, and the fate of the Hapsburgs will be accomplished. An uprising in Bosnia and Herzogovina is a necessary sequel to the freeing of Serbia. Turkey must follow the example of Bulgara, and thus the Berlin Bagdad dream disappears.

ANTHRACITE COAL PRODUCTION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30—Anthracite coal production decreased 241,000 tons during the week ending Sept. 21 as a result of a strike of miners, the Fuel Administration announced today. Bituminous production for the week was 12,650,000, a slight decrease compared to the preceding one, but 218,000 tons greater than the output in the corresponding period of 1917.

KAISER'S FAREWELL TO VON HERTLING

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 30-Emperor William has addressed following to Count Von Hertling: "Your Excellency has reported to me that you no longer find yourself in a position to remain at the head of government. I will not hide from myself your reasons, and must with heavy heart deny myself your further co-operation. You are certain of the thanks of the Fatherland for the sacrifices you made in undertaking the Chancellorship in grave times and for the services you rendered. I desire that the German people shall co-operate more effectively than hitherto in deciding the fate of the Fatherland. It is therefore my will that the men who have been borne up by the people's trust shall in a wide extent co-operate in the rights and duties of government. I beg of you to terminate your work by continuing to conduct the Government's business and prepare the way for measures desired by me until I have found a successor to you."

GENERAL CURRIE GIVEN A BRITISH COMMAND

TORONTO, Sept. 30—It is reported from an authoritative source that General Sir Arthur Currie, Commander of the Canadian Corps in France, will be given command of a British Army, and that Major General Sir David Watson, in command of the 4th Canadian Division, will succeed General Currie as Corps Commander. It is stated that the rumpr is well founded, and that an announcement will be made in the near future. Sir David Watson was the last Canadian officer to be given command of a Division, and it is stated he has shown exceptional ability in directing the operation of the 4th Division.

BULGARIA NOW OUT OF IT

All Bulgarian arms and ammunition are to be stored under the control of the Allies, to whom is conceded the right to occupy all important strategic points. The Associated Press learns that the military occupation of Bulgaria will be entrusted to British, French, and Italian forces and the evacuated portions of Greece and Serbia respectively to Greek and Serbian troops. The armistice means a complete military surrender and Bulgaria ceases to be a belligerent. All questions of territorial rearrangement in the Balkans are purposely omitted from the Convention. The Allies made no stipulation concerning King Ferdinand, his position being considered an internal matter, one for the Bulgarians themselves to deal with. The armistice will remain in operation until a final general peace is concluded.

BRITISH CAPTURED 1000 SQUARE MILES.

LONDON, Sept. 30-Andrew Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer, speaking today at a meeting opening the Autumn War Savings Campaign, said that since July 12th troops of the British Empire had captured 1000 square miles of territory, 250 villages, and more than 120,000 German prisoners.


